SUICIDE SCHEDULE AND 2,000-MILE TRIP FIGURED TOO MUCH FOR NOTRE DAME; VICTORY WILL GIVE HOOSIERS NATIONAL AND ALL-TIME HONORS.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—With a string of eighteen consecutive victories during the last two years still unbroken, Notre Dame's football squad today moved westward to seek a final triumph—one which, if attained, will stamp Coach Knute Rockne's 1930 aggregation as the nation's greatest all-time gridiron machine.

The game with Southern California at Los Angeles Saturday, is the climax to the most difficult schedule ever attempted by a college football team and a victory will give Notre Dame a second successive national championship.
