

TWO BANDITS ARE SLAIN IN 50-MILE CHASE

Escaped Convicts Battle Police After Robbery Attempt Fails.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—A frenzied fifty-mile ride of three escaped convicts and a companion in a stolen automobile, racing to reach a safe hideaway in Manhattan's underworld, resulted today in the killing of two by police and capture of the other two.

The race began in front of a jewelry store in Beacon, N. Y. The convicts, James Clark, Charles Sirico, Peter Reynolds and John Crendon, alias John Michael Lyons, were robbing the store when surprised by police.

Crendon was acting as lookout in front of the store, and whistled as he saw the police approaching. The others rushed out and jumped into a waiting automobile, knocking him down in their haste. He was captured by police. The bandit car speeded toward New York.

At Yonkers patrolman Charles S. Sponner spotted the sedan as it drew up to a curb and two of the men got out. He hit one of them over the head with his revolver, and the man, Reynolds, slumped. The other jumped into the car again and it sped away in the direction of Manhattan.

Clark and Sirico abandoned the car before they reached the New York City line, and halted a taxicab driven by Charles Waldman. But the city police were watching for them.

Patrolmen Raymond Scanlon, Francis Bartley and Max Little, riding in a police car, saw the fugitives in the cab and decided to question them. As they started in pursuit a volley of shots ripped out the rear window of the taxi. They returned the fire and the taxi driver sped away in the direction of his machine to escape the bullets.

When they opened the door of the taxi they found Clark dead and Sirico dying. None of the policemen was injured.

GENERAL WAGE CUT, THREAT IN GREAT BRITAIN

Even Labor Government Is Understood Reconciled to Plan.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—The movement to achieve an all-round reduction in wages, and a corresponding reduction in the cost of living gained impetus in Great Britain over the week-end. Even the Labor government is understood to have become reconciled to the plan.

Advocates of the plan say Britain never will be able to regain her old position in foreign markets unless there are wage cuts. Recent fall in the cost of living shown by index figures issued by the ministry of labor, has given impetus to the movement for a general pay reduction.

Laborites insisted, however, that the index figures are misleading, because there has been no reduction in rents and because some of the reductions in the price of food are merely temporary.
