

HOUSE MEASURE WOULD ABOLISH DEATH PENALTY

Urge Prison Term Instead
of Capital Punishment
in State.

Substitution of a minimum prison
sentence of forty years for capital
punishment will be proposed in a
bill prepared for introduction in the
house of representatives by
Representatives Jacob Weiss (Dem.,

Marion) and Fred A. Egan (Dem.,
Lake).

Paroles would be abolished and
executive pardon by the Governor
would be the only reprieve for per-
sons given such sentences, the bill
provides. Minimum forty-year
terms would be imposed for any
crime now subject to a death sen-
tence.

The mass of bills introduced
Wednesday in the house brought
another admonition from Speaker
Walter Myers, who suggested the
representatives get together by con-
gressional districts and withdraw
superfluous measures or those with
little chance of passage.

Democratic majority members may
hold a caucus to discuss adoption of
the Speaker's suggestion.

Following a public hearing, the
anti-injunction bill is scheduled to
appear in a completely rewritten
form when recommended today for

passage by house judiciary com-
mittee.

The substitute measure, modeled
after the Illinois law, will provide
that judges shall not issue injunctions
in strikes, picketings and
similar labor disputes if they are
conducted peacefully.

The original bill provided for void-
ing of injunction after five days un-
less hearings are held.
