

HOUSE MEASURE WOULD ABOLISH DEATH PENALTY

Urge Prison Term Instead
of Capital Punishment
in State.

Substitution of a minimum prison sentence of forty years for capital punishment will be proposed in a bill prepared for introduction in the house of representatives by Representatives Jacob Weiss (Dem.,

Marion) and Fred A. Egan (Dem., Lake). Paroles would be abolished and executive pardon by the Governor would be the only reprieve for persons given such sentences, the bill provides. Minimum forty-year terms would be imposed for any crime now subject to a death sentence.

The mass of bills introduced Wednesday in the house brought another admonition from Speaker Walter Myers, who suggested the representatives get together by congressional districts and withdraw superfluous measures or those with little chance of passage.

Democratic majority members may hold a caucus to discuss adoption of the Speaker's suggestion.

Following a public hearing, the anti-injunction bill is scheduled to appear in a completely rewritten form when recommended today for

passage by house judiciary A committee.

The substitute measure, modeled after the Illinois law, will provide that judges shall not issue injunctions in strikes, picketings and similar labor disputes if they are conducted peaceably.

The original bill provided for voiding of injunction after five days unless hearings are held.

PATROLMAN IS DEAD

Lee Hensley Succumbs to Pneumonia in City Hospital.

Patrolman Lee Hensley, 44, of 1025 Butler avenue, died in city hospital early today, the victim of pneumonia. He became ill Sunday and was taken to the hospital Wednesday night.

Hensley was appointed to the police force Aug. 15, 1919, and was a World war veteran. He is survived by the widow and a daughter.

SCOUT HEAD GIVEN MEDAL

Indianapolis Boy Gets
Scholarship Honor.

Indianapolis Scoutdom honored Walter W. Head of Chicago, president of the Boy Scouts of America, at a scoutmaster's appreciation dinner Wednesday night in the Columbia Club.

A gold medallion was presented Head by Wallace O. Lee, scout commissioner. Approximately 250 scoutmasters from the city and the Indianapolis area attended the dinner. Head, in an address, told how the

scout movement aided in keeping peace in the world and is fostering understanding between nations. The city's honoring of Head was reciprocated by the scout leader, when he awarded Charles Feibleman of Troop 65, Eagle Scout, the Harmon Foundation scholarship certificate of \$100 for conspicuous service. Feibleman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Isadore Feibleman, 3282 Ruckie street.

LOS ANGELES GETS SOAKING

Boats Washed Ashore and
Cottages Undermined.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 5.—The most beneficial rainstorm which has visited southern California in several years entered its third day today, with indications that it would continue until Friday.

Although torrents fell in outlying sections, flood conditions were at a minimum, and little run-off was recorded by the county flood control engineers. Pasadena, in the foothills to the

east, reported that 3.32 inches of rain fell within twenty-three hours, while North Hollywood recorded 3.4 inches during the same period. Owensmouth, in the San Fernando valley, reported an even 4 inches, and Van Nuys 4.85. Los Angeles had 1.87 inches.

Heavy seas continued to batter the coast line, swept by a southeast wind, but the damage was small. Two cottages were undermined and a small boat owned by the Long Beach Boy Scouts was washed ashore. One cottage was owned by Lee Duncan, trainer of Rin Tin Tin, dog star of the movies. Duncan escaped through a window as the house collapsed and fell into the sea.
