

TWO FIREMEN FACE PROBE OF THEFT CHARGES

Safety Board Investigates
Report of Trunks Taken
From Blaze Scene.

Safety board investigation of alleged pilfering by city firemen after a \$50,000 blaze at 216-22 Osage street last week-end was under way today, on orders of Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan.

Two city firemen who, it is charged, took trunks from ruins of the P-K Specialty Company, whose plant was destroyed in the blaze, are said to have returned them after Clarence Volz, president of the firm, complained to fire department officials.

Volz says other trunks, at least three, are missing, and charges they were carried off by firemen who returned after the blaze, representing themselves as agents of the department's salvage corps. However, that division has been absolved of any accusation of stealing.

The firemen alleged to have admitted taking the property are reported to have returned them to the premises gave them permission to carry away some "burned trunks." They could not identify the man.

Neither will be punished, Fire Chief Harry Voshell said before the mayor ordered Charles Myers, safety board president, to investigate Volz' complaint. Voshell declared he could see nothing wrong in their actions. If they had taken anything of value, it was restored after the men learned their mistake, he contended.

Volz said many cartons around trunks packed for shipment had been ripped, presumably by persons investigating their condition and descriptions.

No one in the building other than himself had power to grant permission to remove the trunks, he said.

'SMOKELESS' DAY TO BE OBSERVED FEB. 20

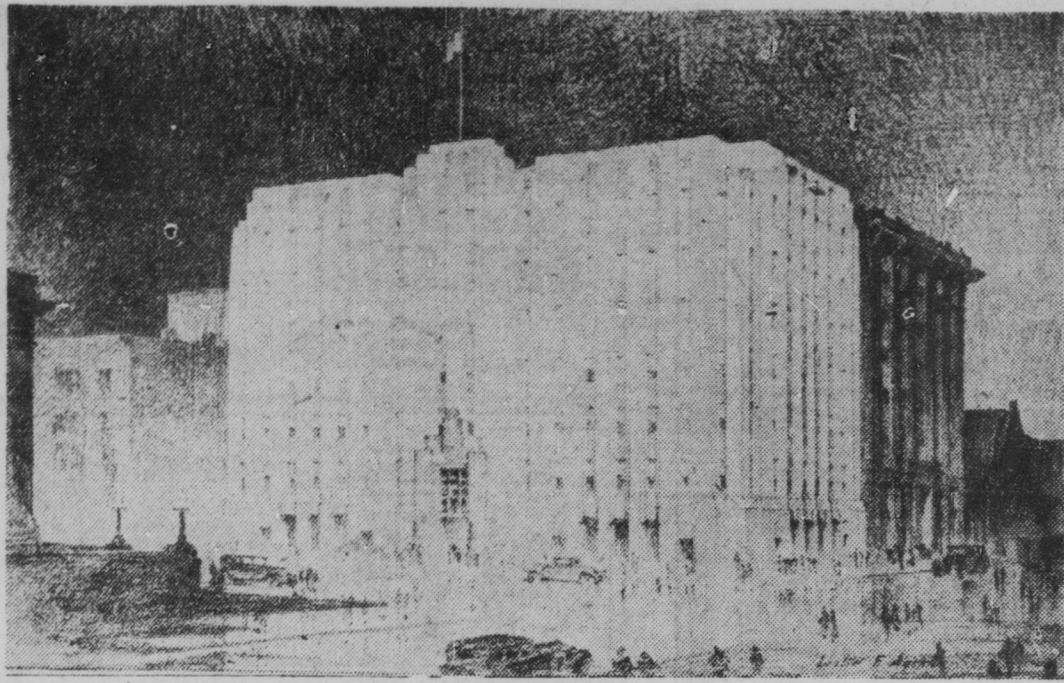
Abatement League Fixes Date for

New Seven-Story Office Building to Be Erected by Telephone Company



On the site of the old Indiana Bell Telephone Company offices, New York and Meridian streets, in the next year will rise a new seven-story structure, at a cost of \$1,850,000, architect's drawing of which is shown above.

Work will be started immediately on excavations for the building adjacent to the old structure moved last summer, according to President

J. F. Carroll of the phone company. It is to be completed in 1932.

Constructed of structural steel and reinforced concrete with an exterior facing of Indiana limestone, the phone building will harmonize architecturally with other new buildings surrounding War Memorial plaza north of the business section.

the architects, and Leslie Colvin, Indianapolis, is general contractor. Erection of the new building will be culmination of an expansion program begun last summer when the old Marion Club building, adjacent to the phone company's office, was razed to make way for moving of the eight-story telephone office to its present location at 15 West New York street.

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BUSINESS HEAD MURDERS CHIEF; ENDS OWN LIFE

Stenographer Finds Bodies
of Railway Officers;
Note Is Found.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Motives were sought today for the killing and suicide of two railway supply executives despite the slight indication of stock market and financial troubles in the note left by the suicide victim saying "he had been fooled into this terrible end by the big shot."

William H. Sauvage, vice-president of the Royal Railway Supply Company, was shot and killed by Andrew Lenahan, office manager of the firm, who then turned his gun on himself, according to the police report.

The police report is based largely on the story told by Mary Farrell, stenographer, married, but working under her maiden name. She had been asked by Lenahan to go get him a headache tablet, and as he supplied one from her purse, he asked her to leave the office because he had some very private matters to talk over.

Miss Farrell went to a soda fountain on the ground floor off the office building at 90 West street, returned a few minutes later, and

found the two men sprawled on the floor, a Spanish automatic pistol with three chambers discharged, a few inches from Lenahan's outstretched hand, she said.

To police, she recalled the fact Lenahan had been writing a letter just before he asked her to leave. The letter, found in the man's pocket, was addressed to his wife in Teaneck, N. J., and had scrawled on the outside, these words:

"The end has come. I am sick, heartbroken and have been fooled into this terrible end by the big shot. The picture has nothing for me now."

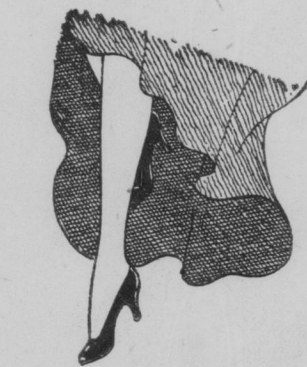
