

2 WOMEN DEAD AS RESULT OF AUTO ACCIDENTS

One Is Killed in Collision
and Another Succumbs
to Injuries.

Two more deaths raised the traffic fatality total to twelve in the city since Feb. 18, according to police records today.

A woman was killed in a collision Tuesday at Twenty-first street and Arlington avenue, and another woman succumbed in city hospital Tuesday night to injuries suffered Saturday when a truck struck her.

Her neck broken and her throat cut by windshield glass, Mrs. Della Evans, 45, R. R. 8, Box 32-F, died instantly in the crash at Twenty-first street and Arlington avenue, in which six others were injured, two of them seriously.

She was housekeeper for W. S. Bain, 71, in whose car she was riding. Bain and Mrs. Elizabeth Wisenberger, R. R. 11, Box 240, were hurt critically, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry B. Canfield, 628 North Gray street, and Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Schneider, Evanston, Ill., were cut and bruised. Canfield was charged with involuntary manslaughter.

Mrs. Dolores Major, 37, who came here from Evansville a week ago seeking employment, and who was struck by a truck Saturday at Massachusetts avenue and Michigan street, died Tuesday night in city hospital.

Kline B. Fergus, 38, of 2838 North Olney street, injured his head when he fell from the running board of an auto driven by Vernon S. Nevitt, 27, Lafayette, in the 2700 block North Sherman drive Tuesday. Nevitt was charged with assault and battery.

When his auto collided with another at Washington street and Rockville road Tuesday night, Dewey Huddleston, 33, of 821 South Meridian street, suffered serious injuries. Thomas Essig, 80, of 1514 Beville avenue, was injured slightly when he fell against an auto at Tenth street and Hamilton avenue.

Frank Douglas, 38, Negro, 1151 Roosevelt avenue, received ankle injuries in a leap from a coal wagon as he saw a collision with a street car at College avenue and Nineteenth street was inevitable. Henry Spoon, 38, of 4404 Caroline avenue, received a broken leg when struck by a motorcycle in the 1400 block East Forty-second street Tuesday night.

MINE PARLEY CONTINUES

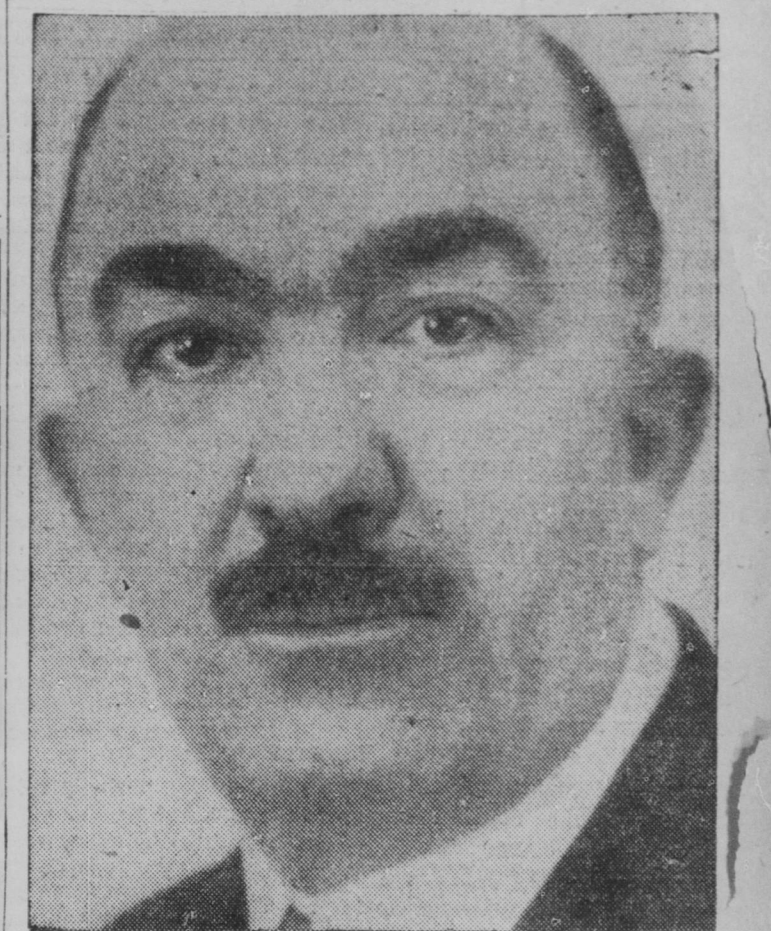
Third Week of Negotiations Under Way at Terre Haute.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Feb. 25.—Six members of the subcommittee of the scale committees of the Indiana Coal Operators' Association and District 11, United Mine Workers of America, are engaged in their third week of concentrated efforts toward a new contract for federation of Indiana mines with no definite arrangements decided upon.

During the past two weeks of discussion the conferees have reported steady progress. Observers close to mine activities have reported that the new contract, to replace the one which expires March 1, will be little changed from the Terre Haute agreement of 1930, under which mines are now operating.
