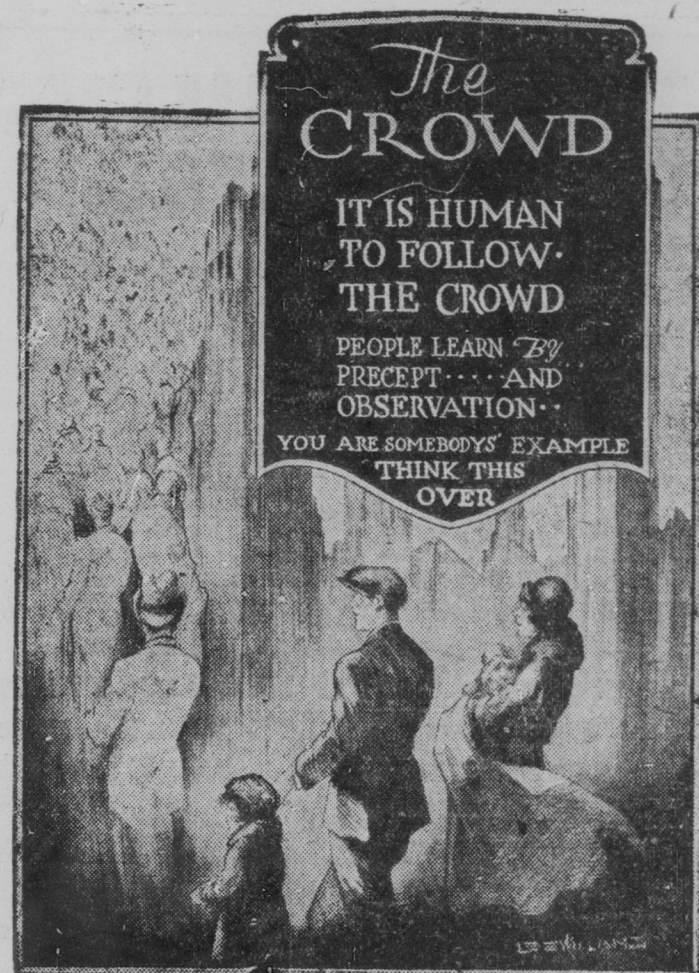
The Golden Rule
