

# HOOVER WILL TOUR COUNTRY THIS SUMMER

Considerable Time to Be Spent Getting Acquainted With People.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—President Herbert Hoover plans to go out to meet the country this summer. His itinerary still is indefinite.

The President may cross the country by a northern route to his home in Palo Alto, Cal.

In that case, he probably would return by a southern route, this affording him an opportunity to visit at least half of the forty-eight states.

This journey is being discussed tentatively at the White House for some time in June.

## Brief Trip Next Week

Meanwhile, Mr. Hoover is looking forward to the prospect of a brief vacation, something he has not had in the last twelve months. His friends and secretaries are urging him to take his fishing pole and visit Florida or some other southern state for about ten days.

They want him to go as soon as he can get away, if possible next Monday. Announcement of such a trip is expected shortly.

While his physician maintains that his health is unchanged despite his arduous efforts in the executive offices, his friends believe a rest is imperative if his health is to continue good.

The western trip may prove an important political venture. Its primary purpose will be to visit the national parks. The President planned such a trip last year, but was forced to postpone it when drought relief work necessitated his presence here.

## May Inspect U. S. Parks

The suggestion has been made to him that he start out early in June by dedicating the Marion (O.) memorial to President Warren G. Harding. From there he could proceed to Madison, Wis., to receive a degree of the University of Wisconsin.

Then his most likely course would be direct to Glacier national park, with later visits to Yellowstone and smaller parks in Washington and Oregon. He probably would stop off for a few days fishing on the Klamath river in northern California.

Returning by the southern route, he could inspect the parks he missed on his outward journey.

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# SCIENCE RULES IN 'BLUE EYES' FORTUNE TRIAL

Color of Parents' Orbs Not Always That of Their Children, Court Told.

CHICAGO, March 5.—Application of the laws of Mendel to decide whether blue-eyed parents can have brown-eyed children had suffered at least three scientific setbacks today, but remained a factor in the legal fight over the \$1,000,000 estate of George W. Longley, Chicago hat manufacturer.

Living proof of the existence of blue-eyed parents with brown eyed children, explanation that Mendel's laws of inheritance applied only to plants, and the statement that the medical fraternity "does not accept Mendelian law," were introduced into Judge Michael Feinberg's courtroom where brown-eyed George

Adair Longley was seeking to prove that he is the son of the manufacturer and his first wife, both of whom had blue eyes.

## Eyes Needn't Match Parents'

Opposing the suit is Longley's third wife, Mrs. Mary Caroline Longley, present beneficiary of the estate, who claims George Adair Longley is not the son of the manufacturer but the brother of his first wife.

Leo Turney, a Glencoe, Ill., jeweler, with blue eyes, was excused from jury duty long enough Wednesday to appear in court with his blue-eyed wife and their two brown eyed children to prove the plaintiff's contention that the children of Azure-eyed parents must not necessarily have eyes of the same color.

Dr. John W. Hudson, professor of genetics, biology and botany at Loyola university, Chicago, aided young Longley when he testified that human eyes follow Mendel's law of inheritance the least of any part of the human body, and added that as far as he knew, Mendel, the Austrian scientist, had experimented solely with plants in arriving at his conclusions on inheritance.

## Wide Interest in Case

Additional emphasis on the controversial eye-color question was advanced by Dr. Frank Walls, spe-

cialist in child diseases, who said he had noticed no definite relationship in the color of the eyes of parents and their children, adding that the "medical fraternity does not accept Mendel."

The question of brown-eyed children and blue-eyed parents, overshadowing for the present the issues of the suit, has evoked nation-wide interest in the case.

Numerous letters received by principals in the case have warned a ruling holding it impossible for blue-eyed parents to have brown-eyed children, would cast aspersions upon the legitimacy of hundreds of children.
