

# PURDUE BOMB VICTIM WELL

Heldergott to Resume Work in Three Weeks.

LAFAVETTE, Ind., March 9.—William F. Heldergott, 43, instructor in the department of practical mechanics at Purdue university, was released from a hospital here today where he had been confined since October when injured in a mysterious bombing.

Heldergott, said he expected to resume his work at the university in about three weeks. Although his face and an arm were scarred badly as the result of his injuries, he did not appear to be crippled, as was feared for a time.

The instructor had gone to his garage to remove his auto preparatory to going to the university one morning in October, when a bomb exploded beneath his machine. The auto was wrecked and Heldergott injured seriously.

The mystery never has been solved.

## RUSSIAN REBELS ARE GIVEN PRISON TERMS

Fourteen Anti-Soviets Confess Guilt to Communists.

MOSCOW, March 9.—Fourteen Mensheviks on trial for "interventionist" activity against the Soviet government were found guilty today and sentenced to varying prison terms.

Seven were given ten years in prison, four eight years and three five years.

The fourteen members of the minority confessed their guilt as the defendants did in the first interventionist trial.

## ROCKET SLED IS TESTED

New Type of Vehicle Fails When Student Makes First Demonstration.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., March 9.—Harry W. Bull's rocket sled B. R. 1, will be given another trial on the ice of Oneida lake today, and Bull hopes then to prove the feasibility of his secret explosive as a means of propulsion.

Tests were attempted Saturday and Sunday, but after news reports and speeches, the secret rockets spluttered out futilely when Bull, a Syracuse university science student, climbed in with his aviator's goggles, helmet, and raw cotton ear pads and tried to start.

Father Caughlin Asks Amendment to Radio Address.
