

DEATH TAKES J. P. COTTON, STIMSON'S AID

New York Lawyer Gave Up
Practice Two Years Ago
to Become Diplomat.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Official Washington today mourned "Uncle Joe" Cotton, undersecretary of state, who died late Tuesday in Baltimore, after a protracted illness.

The New York lawyer who abandoned a lucrative practice to enter President Hoover's official family two years ago had earned an enviable reputation as a plain-spoken, jovial diplomat of the "shirt sleeve" school, and eminently popular with all who knew him.

President Hoover, apprised of Cotton's death, made the following statement:

"Mr. Cotton's passing is a great loss to the government and to our country. He was my friend for more than twenty years. He has given much of his life to public service, and never has refused a demand of the public interest. His abilities, his character, his devotion to the highest purposes made him a great citizen."

Praised by Stimson

Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson, Cotton's chief, praised him for winning a position in the state department which was "entirely unique." He said:

"In the two years in which he has been undersecretary of state, Joseph P. Cotton has rendered service of literally inestimable value to the government.

His wide acquaintance among men; his familiarity with large affairs, both of business and government; his industry and faculty of dispatch; his keen analysis and wide judgment have all served a spirit of high public purpose and a character of unfailing courage."

Castle May Get Post

Cotton's death gave rise to speculation as to his successor. The name of William R. Castle, assistant secretary of state, was most prominently mentioned.

He was considered for the post of undersecretary at the beginning of the Hoover administration, and is a personal friend of the President. Cotton's death generally was attributed to overwork. When Stimson went to the London naval conference he took over all the work of the secretary, and always has been extremely active in the discharge of his duties.

JOHN W. DU VAL, CITY SUGAR BROKER, DEAD

Asphyxiated in St. Louis Apartment; Widow, Daughters Survive.

Body of John W. Du Val, 55, of 621 East Forty-eighth street, who died of asphyxiation in a St. Louis (Mo.) apartment late Tuesday, is expected to arrive in Indianapolis today. Following funeral services at the home at 2 p. m. Thursday the body will be cremated.

Mr. Du Val, a sugar broker, was in St. Louis preparing a residence. He was prominent in Masonic lodge circles, a member of the Traffic Club and the Third Church of Christ, Scientist.

Survivors are the widow and two daughters, Miss Verda Du Val of Indianapolis and Mrs. H. M. Turner of Chicago.

PLANES TO FLY OVER NEW CITY BEACON TONIGHT

Governor Leslie to Press
Button Turning on Giant
Air Light.

Indianapolis will advance another step in aviation tonight when, at 8:15, Governor Harry G. Leslie presses a button turning on the third largest Neon airplane beacon in the country.

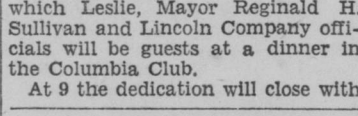
Thirty-six airplanes from city airports will fly over the beacon, located on top of the Merchants Bank building, in dedication ceremonies, which will open at 8:15 when planes, in formation, will fly above the downtown section.

Other planes will join them at 8:15, several of which will remain to circle in the rays of the beacon after it is lighted. The beacon, erected by the Lincoln Oil Refining Company, cost \$50,000.

Citizens will be in contact with the ceremonies by radio. The broadcast of a description of the beacon and attendant thrills of night flying will be relayed to station WFBM from a national guard plane, piloted by Lieutenant Matt G. Carpenter.

Army fliers from Schoen field, Scott field, Belleville, Ill., Sheffields field, Mt. Clemens, Mich., and Wright field, Dayton, O., will participate in the ceremonies, following which Leslie, Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan and Lincoln Company officials will be guests at a dinner in the Columbia Club.
