

UPSET POSSIBILITIES ADD SPICE TO REGIONAL EVENTS

New Faces Expected Among Net Finalists

Washington, Muncie and Frankfort Threatened by Dark Horse Contenders; Other Leaders Also in Danger When Action Opens Saturday.

Upsets of the startling variety are expected Saturday when sixty-four Indiana high school quintets, survivors of the preliminary round in the annual title classic, battle for regional championships and the right to join the final sixteen to battle for the crown at Butler fieldhouse, March 20 and 21.

A season filled with dope bucket tipping was capped last Saturday by an unusual number of firm reversals in the sectionals, and close followers of the net pastime are expecting a proportionate number of thrills in the second step to championship laurels.

The centers provide the best setting for sensational developments. In Vincennes, Muncie and Frankfort, where the three outstanding title choices will compete, there are dark horse contenders menacing the favorites.

Washington Hatchets, defending their 1930 crown, face a possible stumbling block in the Vincennes Alices. Although beaten twice during the season, John Adams' quintet has high hopes for turning the tables on the Fiddlemen. The champions, however, still rate the "dark" post.

Newcastle Confident

At Muncie, the Trojans hope to break the string of regional triumphs turned in by the Bearcats. Year after year the Magic City quintet has come to the state, turning back strong Newcastle teams. With his best combination in seasons, Coach Orville Hooker is confident of stopping the quintet which advanced to the finals of the state event last spring. Pete Jolly's boys, providing they are in top physical shape, will be the favorites, however. Union City is another strong team in this event.

Frankfort, a team which has answered the bell call at every state tournament, has a tough customer to handle in Coach Borkins Jeff of Laysville quintet, which specialized in upsets throughout the season.


As in the other cases, however, the Hot Dogs are expected to come through.

Connerville Threatened

In the other events, there will be the usual scramble among time-honored rivals. Connerville, as usual, will be forced to dispose of Russellville, with Richmond and Lawrence being the latter a dark horse, both dangerous.

Alexandria, Danville and Shortridge of Indianapolis are given an even break in the Anderson regional, with Tipton regarded as the dark horse. Kendaleville and Auburn top the event at the latter place, while the Bedford center

ACK of a gym failed to stop Stendal high school, and the down-staters came through the Petersburg sectional with flying colors and will play Saturday in the Vincennes regional. Stendal attracted state-wide attention during the season by winning twenty of their twenty-three contests, including eleven straight at the start. The gymless five's first foe in the regional will be Washington, defending state champions.

Greencastle will find its chief opposition in Winters and Clinton, while Central of South Bend and Elkhart are expected to battle for honors at Rochester.

Kokomo's ancient rival, Marion, stronger in late season tilts, may prove another surprise, while Wabash and Hartford City both are given upset chances. At Logansport, Peru and Delphi both have hopes, and the Berries appear to be strong and are favored by the draw.

Up in the far north, Horace Mann, Valparaiso and Laporte, playing at Valpo, are rated on a par. The Gary school, going full steam after an in and out season, hold a slight edge.

All in all, it appears that Indiana's "14,000" will see a few new faces on the Fairview pine strips.



Twenty-six rounds of fighting will constitute the weekly fistful bill to be presented by Promoter Bill Bowman at the Riverside Friday night.
