

BOULDER DAM BUILDER MAPS PROJECT WORK

Construction Chief Will Face First Big Task in Rail Facilities.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., March 13.—The man who will build Boulder dam began today to plan the countless details that must be prepared before actual construction work on the gigantic project can start.

Frank C. Crowe, superintendent of construction of the Six Companies, Inc., said that main operations will be held up until at least June 15 when he hoped a power line of the Southern Sierras Company from San Bernardino, Cal., to Boulder City will be completed.

Two hundred men, all of them on the scene and ready for work, will be employed in the preliminary work between now and June 15.

W. R. Armstrong, Union Pacific railroad executive, spent the day with Crowe, planning the miles of railroad facilities that will be necessary to move supplies and materials to Boulder City, the construction town to be built adjacent to the dam site.

Armstrong said that the original railroad yards, designed to accommodate 400 cars at Boulder City, will be enlarged. Two tracks will be added.

Meanwhile, hundreds of letters are pouring in from persons who want employment on the big construction job. The letters are so numerous that many go unread.

Hundreds of tents dot the desert around Las Vegas, sheltering families waiting for work.

Crowe said he saw scores of men on the highway, walking toward Las Vegas.

He issued a warning that there are not enough jobs for all.

"Our first big job is the construction of tracks down the canyon, connecting the government railroad with the dam site," Crowe said. "This road will handle all the equipment coming into the canyon and all the waste materials coming out."

It will be carved out of rock walls and will be part tunnel most of the way. It probably will be double tracked because while we are pouring cement it will have to carry more traffic than the main line of the Southern Pacific out of San Francisco.

It is necessary that we start preparatory work right away because we must have a place to house and feed the men who work on the dam. Establishment of a camp and permanent construction headquarters at the dam is to begin at once."

AWRY GOLFING SHOT COSTS STORE \$8,500

Joe Kirkwood's Slice Into Man's Eye Expensive to Marshall Field.

Francis sued the store for \$8,500, charging negligence. He won the suit, but attorneys for Marshall Field appealed. The appellate court upheld the decision today and Francis now will get his \$8,500 after three years.

ANCIENT TOMB FOUND

Hands and Feet Modeled of Terra Cotta Are Unique Discovery.

CAIRO, March 13.—Hands and feet modeled in terra cotta are a strange feature of the latest tomb discovery of Giza, where Professor Selim Hassan, archeologist of the Egyptian university, is excavating near the great sphinx.

The tomb that has been discovered belonged to a woman of the fourth dynasty, about 2900 B. C. The artificial hands and feet are believed to be a unique discovery in the archeology of Egyptian tombs. It is speculated that they were placed in the tomb to be of use to the woman in the world of the dead.

HOOSIER KILLED AS TRAIN WRECKS AUTO

One Other Man Also Loses Life in Crash at Rail Crossing.

French Desire to Eliminate Bad Manners of Modern Dance.


