

The lists, according to John H. Ale, regional manager of the veterans bureau, were being sold to dealers in used cars, and to other merchants.

A check of the lists showed that the greater percentage of names listed had never applied for loans. Ale warned veterans to decline information concerning bonus applica-

tions, even though the person calling represented himself as being connected with the bureau.

"We are making no calls of this nature," Ale said.

The regional manager says most veterans filing applications for loans will receive their checks within the next three weeks.
