

**'ERRING YOUTH
MUST PAY,' IS
JUDGE'S RULING**

Sentences Boy Thieves to
90 Days on State
Farm.

"Erring youth must feel the lash
of the law."

Thus did Criminal Judge Frank
P. Baker today answer pleas of
parents for lenity for two youths
who, convicted of vehicle taking,
were sentenced to serve ninety days
on the state farm.

The youths were Omer Robison,
16, of 2353 Adams street, and Har-
lan Lane, 2346 Adams street, charged
with the theft of a motorcycle
Sept. 30, from Richard McGinnis,
4020 Cornell avenue. They plead-
ed guilty to unlawful possession,
but denied stealing the machine.

One-to-five year reformatory sen-
tences were meted by Baker to Ernest
Horton, 16, and Clay White, 17,
under pleas of guilty to petit lar-
ceny. Jan. 26 the youths stole five
cigarette lighters and \$2 in cash from
the store of Harry Coble, 802 West
Washington street.

Leslie Gains, 17, was sentenced to
serve four months at the state farm
when Baker found him guilty of
unlawful possession of the car of
Herbert Bateman, 5115 East Michi-
gan street.

TARIFFS ABOLISHED

**Austria, Germany Assess
No Duties on Each Other.**

BERLIN, March 24.—The published text of the new Austro-German commercial pact maintains the independence of both countries, provides for observance of agreements with third nations and is meant as the first step toward reshaping European economic relationships through regional agreements, it was

revealed today.

No export or import duties will be levied by Germany and Austria, and common customs laws and tariff alterations will be drafted only with the consent of both countries.
