

## SUGAR 'TRUST' IS CHARGED IN FEDERAL SUIT

U. S. Asks Court to Dissolve Institute; Price Fixing Is Claimed.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Court action of vital interest to every individual living in the United States is pending as a result of suit filed Monday by the federal government, asking dissolution of the Sugar Institute.

Direct and specific charges of price-fixing, artificial transportation charges, blacklisting and other alleged violations of the anti-trust laws were made against the fifty defendants comprising the institute.

The suit, filed by the United States district attorney in New York, asks a permanent injunction against the institute, forbidding the refiners comprising its membership from maintaining "a comprehensive scheme designed to fix uniform and oppressive prices."

### Cane Refiners Named

The importance of the action may be visualized when it is recalled that the United States consumes one-fourth of the world's sugar production, that the cane sugar output is more than 5,000,000 tons a year, and that the price of cane sugar ranges from 1 to 1½ cents higher than beet sugar.

No beet sugar refiners were named in the complaint. One of the charges is that the cane refiners, producing 85 per cent of the sugar consumed in this country, induced the beet sugar refiners to restrict their competitive activities, and then conspired to keep cane prices uniformly higher than the price of beet sugar.

### Noted Firms Sued

Any reduction in price which might follow government success in this action directly would affect every person in this country, and would be a tremendous item of saving for large users of sugar such as bakers, confectioners, etc.

The sugar institute was organized in 1923 as a "trade association" ostensibly similar to many others that have sprung up in recent years. The list of defendants includes names known to every grocery store patron. Two—the American Sugar Refining Company, and the National Sugar Refining Company—refined nearly half the nation's sugar in 1928.
