

HANDFUL OF MONEY GIVEN POOR FARMERS

Mystery Philanthropist in Auto Hands Out Greenbacks, Speeds Away.

NATCHEZ, Miss., April 3.—Scores of destitute farmers are in possession of real money today for the first time in many weeks because of the benevolence of a mysterious stranger who drove through the Mississippi delta giving away handfuls of greenbacks.

A sports roadster conveying the young man, who told Red Cross officials he was Enos B. Jones of Jersey City, son of a wealthy manufacturer, drew up in front of more than half a hundred homes in the drought area.

Each time the farmer was summoned to the car and his hands stuffed with money. Before he could say anything, the car would speed away.

Jones, who identified his companions as his brother-in-law, E. G. De Vilaine of Paris, France, and Alfred G. Violet of West Port, Conn., apparently had no fixed destination.

The youthful philanthropist said he planned to spread money throughout five more Mississippi delta towns, and five other stricken central states before returning home.

TOO MUCH 'DEAD ART' IN U. S., SAYS EDUCATOR

Even World-Famous Museums Are "Moribund," Charges Dr. Ward.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Americans would be more cultured if their museums were not filled with "collections of dead art," in the belief of Professor Clarence Ward of Oberlin college.

He suggested that art classes in modern schools appeal to the "common sense" and temperament of their students by decorating classrooms with oriental rugs, fireplaces and fine furniture.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 3.—The "only child," long the butt of criticism and ridicule, at last has a champion—in the person of Dr. D.

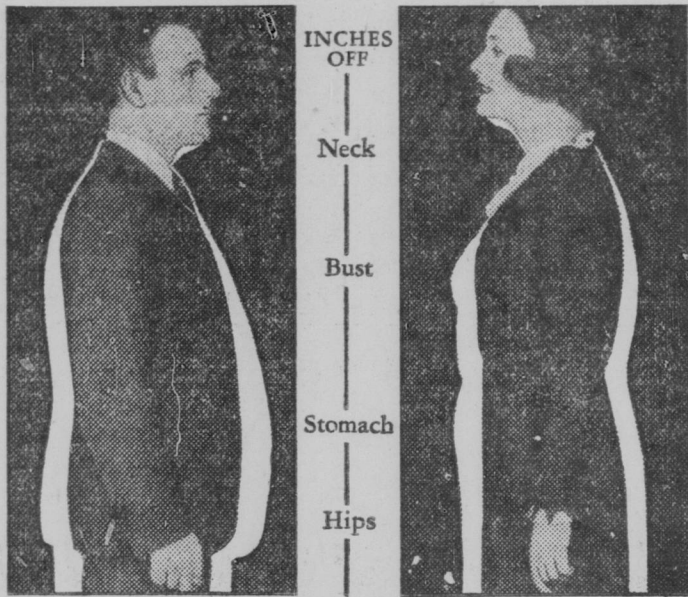
