GANDHI MAY VISIT U. S.

Mahatma Understood to Have Decided on Trip Next Summer.

NEW DELHI, India, April 7.—The Mahatma M. K. Gandhi, leader of millions of Indians in their independence movement, was understood today to have decided to visit the United States after conclusion of the second London round-table conference next summer.

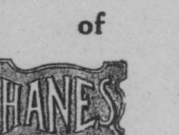

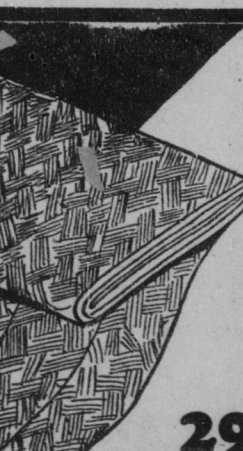
