DIES IN FIRE RESCUE

Grandfather, 72, Pays With Life to
Save Boy, 6.

CHICAGO, May 5.—Six-year-old Joseph Logsdon was in critical condition today, suffering injuries sustained in a fire in which his grandfather, Charles Logsdon, 72, gave his life trying to save him.

The child and his grandfather were left alone while Joseph's parents were away. Police said Joseph apparently set fire to the basement accidentally.

The grandfather, rushing to his aid, was overcome by smoke and was dead when firemen found him. Joseph was unconscious, but physicians said he had a chance to recover.
