North M. E. Congregation to Witness Rite Tonight.

Bishop William F. Anderson of Boston, Mass., will be the principal speaker at services at North Methodist Episcopal church, Meridian and Thirty-eighth streets, tonight, dedicating the new edifice to the community.

With Fred Hoke, president of the church trustees, presiding, the Rev. J. Ambrose Dunkel, pastor of Tabernacle Presbyterian church, will deliver an address presenting the church to the community, and Charles F. Coffin will speak in behalf of laymen.

Addressing about 1,000 persons at

a pre-dedication service for young people in the church Wednesday night. Bishop Herbert Welch of Pittsburgh pleaded for "international mindedness," asserting "there is no clash between real patriotism and international spirit. The man with the township mind is out of place."

LABOR FIRM IN STAND ON BEER

Woman Fails With Plea to Think of Bread.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Organized labor, as represented by the American Federation of Labor, is still for low-power beer, it announced Wednesday night, despite protests by Mrs. Rushmore Patterson, representing the Citizens' Protective league.

The executive council of the federation debated the subject with Mrs. Patterson, and had the last word, reaffirming its stand for modification of the Volstead act. Mrs. Patterson told the council it should not concern itself with

prohibition when what she termed economic issues were before the country.

"The laboring man," she said, "is in need of bread, not beer." The council replied that it believed the economic situation "would be improved materially and employment given thousands if the Volstead act was amended."

DISCUSS FISH HATCHERY

Four Sites in State to Be Inspected by U. S. Men.

Four sites for the proposed United States fish hatchery to be erected in Indiana are to be inspected by federal authorities during the next two weeks.

SENATOR SLAPS HOOVER'S PLAN

Costigan Calls Arms Talk Only Smoke Screen.

DENVER, May 7.—Senator Edward P. Costigan (Dem., Colo.) today criticized President Hoover's "rhetorical pleasantries" in specifying armaments as a chief cause of world economic depression.

Mr. Hoover, speaking before the congress of the International Chamber of Commerce at Washington, Monday declared that armaments were a burden upon economic recuperation.

Costigan said the address illus-

trated "the contrast between preaching and practice, which too long has marred America's international influence and leadership."

"All of us concur in the demand for real disarmament," he said, "but while the administration continues

to spend millions on millions of our taxpayers' money until our expenditures for armaments now approximate \$750,000,000 a year, why prate about the vast burdens of preparedness as a cause for the present depression?"
