

ROBBERS BREAK EVEN IN RAIDS ON DRUGGISTS

\$26 Loot Taken From One Pharmacy; Routed in Another Swoop.

Two gunmen batted .500 Wednesday night when they obtained \$26 in one pharmacy holdup, but fled empty handed, from another, when the druggist yelled for help.

They were successful in the robbery of Rowland Bordeaux, 2725 East Michigan street, at his pharmacy, forcing him to turn over the contents of the cash register.

Shortly before that, they had fled from the pharmacy of J. H. Trees, 3223 East New York street, who denied he had money in the store and called for aid.

Residence of James Haynes, 632 West North street, was looted early today of clothing valued at \$60, he informed police.

Breaking a glass in the rear door of the Daisy Deane tea shop, 140 East Thirtieth street, early today, burglars failed to obtain money, but H. J. Scarborough, proprietor, said they had taken enough food "to make a square meal."

They also attempted to enter the B. H. Kerr candy store, a few doors distant, but were frightened away by Kerr, who heard their attempts to break in.

NINE PRISONERS ON WAY TO FEDERAL PEN

First Detachment of Those Who Pleaded Guilty Leaves City.

First detachment of those who pleaded guilty to charges of violating federal dry, anti-narcotic and motor theft laws in federal court here Saturday, were on their way to Ft. Leavenworth penitentiary.

Harry E. Gates, deputy United States marshal, is in charge of the prisoners. Included are five members of the Terre Haute narcotics ring. They are: Wilbur G. Berry and George W. Harris, who will serve five-year terms; Otto Call, a year and a day; Harry Sprague, two years, and George Barrett, eighteen months.

The other prisoners and their sentences are: Edward Garland, motor theft, five years; Charles Snyder, motor theft, four years; James Dicks, liquor, fifteen months, and Bernard Lewis, motor theft, two years.

FAAMED ENGLISH AIRMAN KILLED

Crash Injuries Are Fatal to Lieutenant Waghorn.

ALDERSHOT, England, May 7.—Flight Lieutenant H. R. D. Waghorn, one of Britain's foremost speed fliers, died today in Cambridge military hospital.

Waghorn was injured Tuesday in a parachute leap from a plane near Aldershot.

Waghorn and E. R. D. Alexander, a civilian test pilot, were testing a two-seated bomber when it became disabled. Both men leaped, but were injured in parachute landings.

injuries. He underwent an operation at the hospital.

Winner of the 1929 Schneider cup seaplane races, Waghorn was one of Britain's best-known aviators. He set a new speed record for

planes when he flashed over the Schneider cup course at Calshot at 328.63 miles an hour, only to see his flying mate, R. L. R. Atcherly, break the mark a few hours later at 332 miles an hour.


