BLACKTOP BOYS OFFER BIDS ON ROAD BUILDING

21 Miles of Improvements
Embraced in Proposals
to State Board.

The clan of "black-top boys" offered their wares at a price to the state highway commission today and probably will find the contracts for improving twenty-one miles of state roads dumped in their laps.

Bids for the improvement of 8.87 miles of State Road 40 (National road) from Cynthiana to Newfield; State Road 43 in Owen and Putnam counties, and another section of 43 in La Porte county were received by the commission.

Low bidder on the Road 40 project was the Andrew Asphalt Company, \$264,745 for asphaltic macadam, \$271,555 for bituminous concrete and the N. B. Putman Company, \$265,946 for rock asphalt.

Concrete Cheaper

After receipt of the bids, a contractor declared that the National road project could be carried out \$5,000 a mile cheaper if concrete were used.

During the legislature the "black top" interests battled for the commission and Commissioner Jess Murden is attributed with having made the assertion "We'll have to take care of those boys."

Low Bidders Listed

Other low bidders today: Road 43 in Owen and Putnam counties, Myers Brothers, \$69,354 for asphaltic macadam, \$70,547 for bituminous tread and Hays Construction Company, \$101,393 for bituminous coated aggregate.

Road 43 in LaPorte county, Reith Riley Construction Company, \$64,115 for asphaltic macadam, \$66,745 for bituminous concrete, and the A. W. Taylor Construction Company, \$62,938 for rock asphalt.
