

## ITALY READY TO JOIN U. S. PEACE MOVES

Broad Disarmament Plan in High Favor With Fascist Heads.

ROME, July 9.—Italy, it became known on high authority today, strongly favors a broad disarmament plan.

It is ready to co-operate with President Hoover's moves for arms reductions.

This information, extremely significant in the United States' move to control the staggering costs of big armies and navies as an aid to world rehabilitation, coincided with nearly an hour's visit of United States State Secretary Henry L. Stimson to Foreign Minister Dino Grandi at the foreign office.

Neither revealed the subject of their conference, but it was assumed that the meeting marked the opening of a series of conferences between Stimson and European statesmen designed to align old world powers behind the President's moves.

Italy is advocating a broad disarmament plan, first because she feels Germany almost is eliminated from being able to pay reparations, and second, because European budgets are unable to bear the burdens of maintaining big arms establishments.

### Hugh Gibson Named

WASHINGTON, July 9.—William Castle, acting secretary of state, today announced the appointment of Hugh Gibson, American ambassador to Belgium, as the United States' representative at the London meeting of fiscal experts to discuss means of putting the Hoover debt postponement plan into effect. The meeting starts Monday.

Gibson will be assisted by Frederick C. Livesay, assistant economic advisor of the state department. Livesay is considered an authority on international finance.

Gibson and Livesay will have no votes, but will be present at all meetings of the committee. Their presence there will be considered a safeguard against departure from the spirit of the Hoover plan, which provided unqualified relief from debts during a year for all participating governments.

Discussing the present outlook for prompt effectiveness of Mr. Hoover's plan, Castle said that "undoubtedly" arrangements will be made so that Germany will not have to declare a moratorium on July 15, the day its next reparation payment is due.

Purpose of the commission is to arouse interest and foster programs for the bicentenary celebration of George Washington's birth.

## TEACHERS JOIN IN FIGHT FOR TOM MOONEY

Prestige of Courts Badly Damaged, Federation Tells Governor.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The damage to the prestige of American courts and the handicap such damage places upon the teachers of American youth as the result of the Mooney-Billings scandals in California are stressed in pardon resolutions passed at the recent Chicago convention of the American Federation of Teachers.

The resolutions were introduced by Miss Mary C. Little, Memphis (Tenn.) teacher-member and chairman of the resolutions committee, and made public here today by Miss Selma Borchardt, vice-president of the federation and legislative representative. The resolution, unanimously passed, reads:

"Whereas, the conviction of Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings on evidence which is now admitted by the judge who conducted the trial as having been perjured and the retention of these men in prison upon a technicality after the admission of perjured evidence will destroy the respect for law and the administration of justice, and

"Whereas, we as teachers are charged with presenting in our own schools a truthful interpretation of our government, institutions and their functions, and

"Whereas, the conduct of the state and court officials of California in the Mooney-Billings cases will create grave doubts in the minds of students in our schools upon the intention of officials to uphold justice in that state, and

"Whereas, without confidence in government there can be no deep loyalty to it; therefore, be it

## FEELING RUNS BITTER AGAINST KILLER SUSPECT

Youth, Held in Lima (O.) Murders, Is Hurried to Toledo.

TOLEDO, O., July 9.—James May, 22, held in connection with the double murder of Thelma Woods, 17, his former sweetheart, and Earl Truesdale, 20, whose battered bodies were found in a quarry pond near Lima, O., was in the custody of Toledo police today, safe from violence feared in Allen county.

The youth, questioned and released when Thelma and her companion disappeared May 30, was brought here Wednesday night and placed in the safety building after his arrest in Lima.


Sheriff Jesse Sarber said feeling against May was strong in Lima, and that he did not want to run the risk of mob action by keeping the prisoner in the Allen county jail.

Lima police would not discuss evidence against May, who was arrested on a warrant sworn to by Don Truesdale, father of the slain boy. Arraigned before a Lima justice of the peace, May pleaded not guilty to a charge of murdering Truesdale. He was ordered held without bail.

The bodies of the Lima girl and

her escort to a Memorial day eve dance, weighted down with rocks, were discovered by workmen who were dragging the pond two weeks after the couple were reported missing. May, according to police, quarreled with his former sweetheart a short time before the couple disappeared.




