

## Medicine Is Cited Field for Women

Speaking before the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, in session at Richmond, Va., Dr. Helen H. Shelley, San Jose, Cal., said today that the medical profession offers exceptional opportunities to women, and urged more business women to take up medicine as a career. She said that most women prefer women physicians, and added that the demand for women physicians can be supplied.

Marion H. McClench, Ann Arbor, Mich., president, spoke on the attitude of business women, saying that "Jobs are regarded by most women as something to occupy their time while waiting to get married," and "Business women generally still are doing clerical work, not because of lack of efficiency, but because of their mental attitude."

Delegates discussed methods of improving present business conditions. President McClench suggested that congress employ expert commissioners to assist legislators. Mabel Vollmer, Evanston, Ill., and Mme. Mary Laudner of Paris, founder of the first business women's club in France, laid the blame on the present tariff situation.

## Daily Recipe CREAMED BACON AND MUSHROOMS ON TOAST

2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 cup chicken broth  
1 cup evaporated milk  
1 cup canned mushrooms  
1 cup crisp, cooked bacon  
Salt and pepper  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Melt butter, add flour and stir until well blended. Add boiling broth and evaporated milk. Cook directly over flame about 5 minutes. Add the mushrooms and bacon chips. Mix with sauce lightly to prevent crushing. Season with salt and pepper and serve immediately on hot, buttered toast. Garnish with a little chopped parsley.

## Chicken is 'Safe' Choice for Guests

Chicken is always a safe choice to serve a group of people whose tastes are not well known to the hostess. Everyone likes it and even those on a reducing diet usually eat it.

Broiled chicken appeals to many people and the meat is tender and delicious. Fried chicken also is a toothsome morsel, a bit more substantial than the broiled meat, but tender and delicately flavored.

A chicken of frying size also can be roasted to excellent advantage and is particularly suitable for summer dinners.

Of course these methods of cooking bespeak birds fresh from the market, but there are so many times a chicken dish is wanted, when fresh chicken is not available, that the busy housewife will find it well worth her while to become acquainted with the many excellent brands of canned chicken on the market.

Do not let the meat actually cook during the reheating process. It not only loses its flavor, but becomes tough and dry. Cook the sauce thoroughly and add the chicken just long enough to reheat it.

## CHINESE CHICKEN

Three cups diced chicken, one cup drained crushed pineapple, three tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon white pepper, one and one-half cups chicken stock.

The chicken stock can be made by dissolving one or two bouillon cubes in one and one-half cups boiling water.

Melt butter and add pineapple.
