

TAPS SOUNDED AT HOME FOR AGED VETERANS

David Stephens, 81, Dies at Danville, Ill.; Davis Rites Are Set.

Taps sounded Thursday for another of Marion county's Civil war veterans, and several residents of the city who had passed the mid-century mark died here.

Body of David Stephens, 81, was to be returned from the United States soldiers' home at Danville, Ill., for funeral and burial here. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Mr. Stephens died in the home, where he went two weeks ago. Survivors are the three daughters and a son.

A graduate of De Pauw university, Mr. Davis was American Red Cross field director in eastern Kentucky many years. The widow, two sons, four brothers, two sisters, and two grandchildren survive him.

LULL IN CITY'S CRIME WORRIES WAITING POLICE

'Just Calm Before Storm,' Old-Timers Say of Quiet.

Apprehensions, bugaboos, hunches and "bad signs" held sway today at police headquarters.

Day and night for the last week, police officers and detectives have watched the city's crime decrease, until today an ominous stillness prevails.

Feet are on desks and an electric current of expectancy makes the already oppressive atmosphere of the police station doubly oppressive.

Old-timers is the police business admit they are worried.

Take Captain Ed Helm, who for twenty-five years, has seen the ups and downs of crime and its pursuit.

"Boys, there's always a lull before the storm," he says. "This peace and quiet means no good for anybody."

Fred Simon, detective chief, has had some business this week with alleged bandits captured and a murder suspect held for several hours.

"But that's not enough," he mourned. "It's too quiet to last. There's something wrong some place. This is a bad time for all this quiet."

However, Police Chief Mike Morrissey has the idea that the depression has something to do with the depression in crime.

"I think the crooks are ashamed

to take anybody's money nowadays," he said.

For the first time in months and months, police officers didn't receive a bulletin of crimes to stuff in their caps at roll call.

"Nope, my paper didn't go to press Thursday afternoon," Sergeant Jack O'Neill, head of the "bulletin department," said. "There wasn't anything to put in it, so I just suspended publication for a while."

The officers, though, are not happy over the lack of work.

"Lulls like this are bad," they

say. "It's always the same. It's the quiet before the storm."

CARRIER PIGEON USED FOR RANSOM DEMAND

Plane to Trace Bird Carrying \$25,000 Extortion Note.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—A police plane was ready today to ride the airways in pursuit of a carrier pigeon believed to have been used by an ingenious band of kidnappers in an attempt to extort \$25,000 for the return of the 16-year-old son of a prominent attorney, who told them to "go to hell."

An unknown man called Edgar

F. Hazleton, former municipal court justice, and informed him the ransom had been raised from \$2,500 because of the attorney's determination to take the case before the Queens county grand jury.

The ransom demands have been

accompanied by carrier pigeons equipped to carry currency attached to their legs. Hazleton tied a note to three of the birds, asking that a message be written by his son to establish his identity. The supposed kidnappers refused.
