

## MARKED MONEY NABS KIDNAPERS OF RICH BROKER

Rosenthal's Abductors Had Planned to Kill Their Chief, Says Cops.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—The sudden, unexplained affluence of two hoodlums, coupled with the old police trick of copying the serial numbers of ransom money, was responsible for the capture today of the gang which kidnapped Charles M. Rosenthal, millionaire broker.

Four men and one woman were under arrest as details of the spectacular roundup were made known. Capture of the gang, police said, probably saved the life of the ring-leader, for he had double-crossed his followers in distributing the ransom money and was to be "put on the spot."

Those arrested were:

Clarence (Nick) Green, 29, Negro, arrested at Atlantic City. He is the ringleader of the gang, according to police, and proprietor of the Hotel Vendig, New York.

Bettine Green, 29, colored, arrested with Green at Atlantic City where the two were living in an apartment.


Jack Markham, arrested in New York.

Theodore Adinolfi, alias Harry King, 26, of New York.

Albert Sileo, alias John Rocco, arrested with Adinolfi in a Newark apartment where they were living in suddenly acquired luxury.

napping prospects, all wealthy and some prominent.

Rosenthal, who is 23 and lives in Lawrence, L. I., was released after seventeen days of captivity in a Manhattan apartment after his mother had paid the gang \$50,000 ransom. The negotiations were carried on through the personal column of a morning newspaper.

After two attempts, the money was left in a bag in the checkroom of the Hotel Vendig, police said. They learned that Green opened the bag and removed \$25,000 before splitting the rest with his compa-

nions. He then went to Atlantic City with the woman.

Pooco and Adinolfi were captured in a surprise raid Monday night, and confessed, police said, after they were shown the serial numbers of bills in their posses-

sion.

Acting on this information, de-

tectives left at once for Atlantic City with Rosenthal, and arrested Green and the woman. Rosenthal, they said, identified his captors.

Adinolfi and Sileo, according to police, were planning to kill Green for double-crossing them.


