

15 MILES BEING ADDED TO CITY STREET LAYOUT

Year's Program Decreases
From Paving Mileage
During 1930.

Street paving and resurfacing projects totaling almost fifteen miles in length will be completed by the city this year before the arrival of winter, according to a report prepared today by A. H. Moore, city engineer.

Hundreds of men, who otherwise might have been without jobs, benefited from employment on the construction projects, Moore pointed out.

Total mileage paved by the city this year was considerably less than last year when more than twenty-two miles of paving was laid. Decrease in mileage was due to reduction of the 2-cent levy for resurfacing in effect last year, to 1/2 cent this year. It was shown.

With completion of fifteen paving projects already, more than one-third of the various projects have been completed, leaving twenty-five others in process of construction or ready to be started within a short time.

Sixteenth Street Next

The largest paving project included in the group is East New York street, which over a period of several years is being straightened and converted into a wide east and west arterial highway.

Construction work is progressing on one section of the street, from Gale to Emerson, more than a mile, and work is to start soon on the section from State to Randolph.

In addition, steps are under way for opening the section from Arsenal to State and for paving the section from Big Four railroad to Highland avenue.

Bids have been received and work is to start soon on widening and resurfacing of Sixteenth street from Delaware to Illinois and from Capitol to Northwestern.

Projects Soon to Start

Among projects completed this year are:

California, Washington to Maryland; Twelfth, Oregon to Brooks; West New York, State to Randolph; New York, Gale to Emerson; Illinois, State to Illinois; and Capitol to Northwestern. Shelby, Craft to Summer; Shelby, Summer to Troy; Thirtieth, Meridian to Capitol; Walnut, Holmes to Concord; Ashland, Fourteenth to Twenty-first and Twenty-third to Twenty-fifth; Broadway, Seventeenth to Twenty-first; College, Massachusetts to Eleventh; College, Wright to Leonard; Delaware, Thirtieth to Fortieth; Emerson, Washington to Brookville road; Kentucky, Harding to Belmont; Maryland, Kentucky to Virginia.

Paving, resurfacing and surface treatment projects which either are under construction or are scheduled to start soon include:
