## STORM HALTS SALVAGE

Divers Almost Reach Sunken Gold When Driven Back to Port.

BREST, France, Nov. 3.—The Italian salvage ship Artiglio was driven to port by storms Monday night when believed almost within reach of \$500,000 in gold in the vaults of the sunken liner Egypt.

The Artiglio has been attempting to salvage the gold on the ocean floor of Brest ever since the big liner went down after a collision in fog in 1922.

## 'GOOSIE' LEE DROPS APPEAL, TAKES TERM

Negro Politician to Serve Two Years on Rum Charge.

Harry (Goosie) Lee, politician, and George Graham, Negroes, today have dropped a liquor case appeal in federal court and each will serve two years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth.

They were arrested last spring, and since then the conspiracy count was filed. With dismissal of the appeal action, federal attorneys probably will not press the conspiracy count, it was said.

## DYNAMITERS OF HUGE AQUEDUCT HIDE IN DESERT

Disgruntled Employees Are Blamed for Explosion Near Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—Two disgruntled employees were sought in the desert east of Owens valley today for the dynamiting of a section of the Los Angeles aqueduct, which

carries water 250 miles from Owens river to the city.

Investigations learned that two men formerly employed by the bureau of water and power placed a case of dynamite under the huge nine-foot siphon at Jawbone canyon late Sunday night and fled into the desert. Their arrest was expected today.

Five million gallons of water a minute poured from the conduit onto the valley floor before it was turned off at Hawaiee reservoir. Damage was extensive, but did not inconvenience the city, which had ample water in storage. The siphon will be repaired within four days, it was announced.

Fortunately, a manhole at the siphon permitted air to rush into the pipe, preventing its collapse.

The dynamiting was another of a long series of outrages against the water project which have flared up

periodically for the last twenty years.

Opposition of Owens valley farmers to what they called the city's "steal" of their water was the cause of the original sabotage. The ranchers, however, were not blamed for Sunday's blast.

For years they have seen their lands dry up as more water was taken from the Owens river. In desperation, they were forced to sell their lands to the city at prices they declared were robbery.

A long guerilla warfare against the city was carried on.

On Rice's car was a sign identifying the automobile as one being used in the Community Fund drive. When Rice returned for his car, it was gone. It had been towed in. Rice spent more than an hour attempting to recover his car, which finally was released without cost to him.

Police officials could not explain how the car, bearing a Community Fund marker, happened to be towed in.


