

2 LOSE LIVES, 7 INJURED IN AUTO MISHAPS

Aged Persons Are Killed;
Stricken Down as They
Cross Streets.

Automobile accidents on sheet-covered streets Tuesday night claimed the lives of two aged persons and resulted in injuries to seven others.

The dead are Henry Segal, 80, of 705 South Meridian street, and Mrs. Mary Gellert, 71, of 835 Fletcher avenue.

Their deaths, after they were struck by automobiles as they crossed thoroughfares, raised Marion county's traffic fatality toll to 163 for the year, a record number of automobile deaths in the county's history.

Segal succumbed to skull fracture at city hospital several hours after he was hit in the pavements on McCarty and Meridian streets by an automobile driven by Maurice Stein, 45, of 906 South Illinois street. Segal never gained consciousness after the accident.

In a statement to Coroner Fred W. Vehling, Stein said he did not see Segal crossing the street because of the rain and sleet which obscured his view.

Mrs. Gellert is said to have walked into the path of an auto driven by Armas Stokse, 20, of 950 West Ver-

mont street, at Stevens street and Virginia avenue.

Mrs. Gellert was killed instantly. Her identity was not known until several hours after her son, Paul Gellert, 1427 Comer avenue, reported to police his mother was reported to police his mother was

After he is alleged to have crashed into a parked police car, Glenn Sawyer, 32, of 2819 Kenwood avenue, was arrested Tuesday night on a charge of failure to stop after accident. Patrolman Irvin Bailey said he pursued Sawyer from the scene of the accident, 1233 Oliver avenue, to 1000 West McCarty street.

Deputy sheriffs and police were investigating the story of an accident on the National road west of Indianapolis told by Glenn Coffey, 19, of Newcastle, who was brought to city hospital Monday night, suffering from critical face and body lacerations.

He said a companion had been hurt seriously in the accident when

their car collided with another. Coffey said he was carrying his companion to a farmhouse when an automobile struck him.

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
