

MARKET PROBE BY COUNCIL IS GOAL OF MYERS

Safety Board Head Urges
Changes; Cites Profit
on Investment.

Investigation of city market conditions with a view of obtaining city council approval of much-needed changes, will be sought by Charles R. Myers, safety board president.

Myers today said he will seek an early conference with Ernest C. Rojek, council president, asking appointment of a committee from the council to study market conditions thoroughly, as was suggested at a council meeting several weeks ago.

The investigation was prompted by councilmen's delay of action on Myers' request for a \$1,500 appropriation to improve the east market, in order to fill vacant stands on the Alabama street side of the market.

Reported Favorably

A committee named to investigate need of the improvement reported favorably, but action was deferred until after first of the year.

"I think the council well could afford to be more generous in its appropriations for the market house, in view of the fact it returns a good profit," said Myers.

"In 1930, market leases brought fees of \$37,451, east market stand fees were \$13,841, while refrigeration fees produced \$5,384, a total of \$56,877, and a net profit of 275 per cent. Figures for 1931 are not yet available.

"Only about \$20,000 was allowed in the budget for operation of the market.

Still Returns Profit

"Even allowing for taxes on a \$300,000 mythical investment, \$8,340, and \$18,000 mythical interest, the market still returned a profit of nearly \$10,000."

Figures of Myers are questioned by Francis M. Coleman, deputy city controller, who pointed out that to expenses of the market must be added more than \$4,000 in police salaries, and various other sums to cover costs of services given by other city departments, such as cleaning of the market at night by sanitary board employees and services of health board inspectors.

Back to Indians"

"If we stopped to figure out all the market costs the city we would 'give it back to the Indians,'" Coleman recently told council members.

Among improvements needed at the market, according to Myers, are ventilation system changes, sewer repairs and a readjustment in stand fees.

"We couldn't close the market without a howl from the public, so we might as well put it in good shape and increase its business, thus increasing the city's revenue," Myers said.

The city was given title to the property with the provision that it always maintain a public market on the site.

DRAFTS TRUST LAWS

Senator Nye Proposes Bill to Strengthen Statute.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Bills to strengthen greatly the anti-trust laws, laid before Congress by Senator Gerald Nye, (Rep., N. D.), will be considered before long by the Senate judiciary committee.

Nye proposes to make illegal the selling of goods below cost, and to provide by law that price discrimination shall be an unfair method of competition. He would give rules resulting from trade practice conferences the force and effect of law when approved by the federal trade commission; and he would create a federal trade commission court to have jurisdiction in cases arising from the Sherman and other anti-trust acts.
