

LEWIS DEFENDS UNION POLICIES AT CONVENTION

Attacks Illinois Opponent, Outlines Work Done in Strike Fields.

two years been charging that the United Mine Workers is dead—now the say it is dying, a most peculiar corpse," he intoned in his deep bass voice.

Lewis challenged Hindmarsh's right to be a delegate, inasmuch as the Riverton local, of which he is a member has not paid its union tax for six months.

He described the difficulties experienced in organizing the Alabama fields where it was necessary to feed 48,000 strikers, their wives and children for seven months, fight eviction suits, and pay \$250,000 in judgments.

Turns Talk on Kentucky

Lewis then turned his attention to the conditions in Harlan county, Kentucky, where the Black Mountain Coal Company, a subsidiary of the Peabody Coal Company and the Insull interests, built a high wire fence around the mines, hired carloads of guards protected by armored vests and armed with shot-guns to break up assemblies, evict miners and their families, and used the injunction and guards to forbid the right of free assemblage.

What would Delegate Hindmarsh do in such a condition?" Lewis asked.

"Constitutional rights of the miners are being violated constantly, their economic rights invaded and we have no hope beyond legislation," he said.

The president then described the two bills pending in congress, which would guarantee the right of collective bargaining, control the coal operators and abolish the yellow dog contract.

Apologies to Make

"I have no apologies to make for my administration," Lewis shouted in defiance.

Jesse Hughes, Spurgeon, Ind., led the day's attack upon Hindmarsh with the assurance to Lewis that all Indiana was behind the international organization. His position was upheld by John Owen's, Cambridge, O.; Edward Cole, Bicknell, Ind., and George W. Savage, secretary-treasurer of District 6, Coolumbus, O.

Savage told the delegates that the distressing situation within the ranks of miners was aggravated by secret alliances between U. M. W. of A. rebels and operators.

The insurgency of the Illinois group is an aftermath of the resumption of two years ago, when Lewis attempted to set up a provisional government in that state at a cost of \$56,000, only to be enjoined from interference by the courts.

Chief points in the insurgent attack apparently are demands for reduction in salaries of officials, election of field representatives and traveling auditors by the rank and file, divorcing the union entirely from the federal government, aggressive organization work in non-union fields and limitation to two terms as the time that international officers may serve.

PLAN TAX HEARINGS

Survey Commission Maps Program of Public Sessions

Plans for public hearings, similar to those held during the interim between the 1929 and 1931 legislatures, are being made today by members of the state tax survey committee meeting in the directors' room of L. S. Ayres & Co.

Senator J. Clyde Hoffman is chairman.

He announced that first hearings will be devoted to consideration of economy measures to reduce governmental costs and a second group of hearings will cover new revenue measures. Recommendations of the committee to the 1931 session came to naught.




