

DELAY ON ROAD BUILDING VEXES COMMISSIONERS

County Officials Say State Highway Department Is Withholding Jobs.

Indiana's state highway commissioners virtually are laughing at the plight of Marion county's unemployed by refusing to spend funds for construction projects, it was charged today by Marion county commissioners.

Commissioners cited the state's refusal to start construction of a fifty-five-mile rural belt highway, circling the city, estimated to cost \$1,500,000.

"This project would put 2,000 men to work, if started in sections at this time," Commissioner Thomas Ellis stated.

Hit Land Gouge, Charge

The highway commission was scored by the county officials for its excuses for delaying the expenditure of \$1,000,000 in rerouting United States Road 31, north of Indianapolis.

"Statements that property owners, desiring to pioneer, are holding up that project appear as a big price to me," Dow W. Vorhies, president of the Marion county board, declared.

"The commission can condemn that land and have it appraised, if it wants to do that work."

Highway commissioners have explained they are seeking to buy the desired property at an agreed price rather than acquire it by condemnation because of the long delay usually occasioned by the latter process.

Urge Circum-Urban Road

The newly reorganized county board is suggesting that the state highway department spend a portion of its \$750,000 emergency work construction fund in building a highway around Indianapolis.

Surveys have been made of a route, touching more than a score of outlying towns.

"State officials laughed at us when we recommended the belt highway as a construction project that would give jobs to many unemployed," Commissioner George Snider said.

Highway commissioners hold the view that highways should be paved throughout the state before such an expenditure can be made in one locality as the circum-urban project here would entail.

JOHNSON BILLS SEEK CURB ON FOREIGN BONDS

Provide for Full Publicity; Dry Open Fight on Beer Measure.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Senator Johnson (Rep., Cal.), who instituted the senate's investigation of foreign bond flotations in the United States, introduced in the

senate today bills to provide for future supervision of such transactions and requiring full publicity for all operations. The bills were referred to the judiciary committee.

Prohibitionists today began their attack in senate committee hearings on the Bingham proposal legalizing 4 per cent beer.

Louis J. Taber, master of the National Grange, led off for the dry forces, placing the farm organization on record as firmly opposed to any revision of the prohibition laws.

The Grange believes consideration of the beer proposal retards work on "more vital problems in this greatest peacetime crisis," Taber said. "No nation in history ever has been able to drink itself prosperous." Secretary of War Hurley opposed

the proposed consolidation of the war and navy departments into one department of national defense on the ground it would not contribute to efficiency of the two services.

"Such a department would neither add to the efficiency of the services nor provide for economy of administration," Hurley told the house expenditures committee, now considering the consolidation bill of Chairman Byrns of the house appropriations committee.

A coalition of Democrats and independent Republicans in the senate finance committee lost the first conflict with administration supporters today in the effort to make congress instead of the White House dominate the tariff commission.

Senator Harrison (Dem., Miss.) obtained adoption of a series of amendments to the tariff bill which

has passed the house. But he was unable to obtain a favorable committee vote on the amended bill.

A broad congressional investigation into the silver problem was assured when the senate rules committee approved a resolution by Chairman Somers of the coinage, weights and measures committee for an inquiry by his committee.

House approval of the investigation is a routine matter. The resolution will be brought up early for action there.

The resolution authorizes an inquiry into the cause and effect of the present depressed price of silver, the monetary policies of the United States and foreign countries and their relation to the value of silver, methods of stabilizing its price, and the advisability of an international conference to consider measures for stabilizing the price.
