

# HEALTH BOARD ACTS TO OBTAIN MILK SUPPLY

Morgan Advises Group on  
Procedure; Defends  
10,000 Figure.

City health board machinery was set in action toward supplying milk to all needy and undernourished children at a meeting Wednesday in charge of Dr. Herman G. Morgan, health officer. The number has been estimated at 10,000 by Dr. Morgan and other social agency heads. Morgan advised the personnel of the department of the requirements necessary for obtaining milk from the township trustees and told them to take immediate steps toward seeing that no child who deserves milk is neglected.

At a meeting in Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan's office Monday, city, county and relief agency officials agreed the trustees who are now feeding thousands of families and attempting to supply milk needed, should be given an opportunity to increase the milk allowance to meet the need.

Both Miss Noone and Dunn agreed to make every effort to meet such demands and stated they would investigate every request for milk to determine whether such request be from a deserving family.

Morgan said a more systematic check undoubtedly would vindicate the figures of 10,000 children below school age in need of milk in the city. The figure, reached by Morgan and heads of local social agencies, was disputed by some at the meeting in Sullivan's office last Monday.

## FIREMAN KILLED FIGHTING BLAZE

Six Others Hurt in Blast at  
Kansas City.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 28.—A fireman died, six persons were injured, a three-story building was demolished and hundreds of windows shattered in an explosion in the principal business district today.

Lieutenant Daniel J. McCarty was overcome by smoke and died while

fighting the fire which followed the blast.

The explosion occurred in a building occupied by a wholesale meat company and a restaurant. Gas caused the explosion, police decided after an investigation today.

Although the building was on one of the city's principal streets, few persons were near it when the explosion occurred shortly after midnight. Three men were injured, none seriously by falling glass and debris.

Charles Hawk, 61, may lose the sight of one eye as the result of cuts on his face, physicians said. Windows in the postoffice, two blocks from the explosion, were blown out.
