DALE CONVINCED STATE SEAT IN HOUSE 'STOLEN'

Muncie Mayor Conducts His Own Probe Into Ball's 'No Contest.'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—George Dale, "the fighting mayor of Muncie," is in Washington, conducting a little investigation of his own into the status of the Ball-Vestal congressional contest.

Perhaps it would be more accurate to say that he is inquiring into the non-existence of a Ball-Vestal contest.

At least the scrappy little mayor, with his investigation almost completed, is of the very definite opinion that there is no such thing as a contest of the right of Albert H. Vestal, Republican, to occupy the seat in congress allotted to the old Eight Indiana district.

Particularly, Dale has loaded his guns with ammunition to fire at his arch enemies, State Chairman Earl Peters and Claude Ball, his fellow townsman from Muncie, who was Vestal's opponent in the 1930 elections.

The official count in the old Eight district gave Vestal the small margin of nine votes over Ball.

Dale made the rounds here Thursday.

He interrogated Henry T. Rainey, Democratic house leader, who said he had never heard anything to indicate that Ball ever had seriously prosecuted his claim for the seat.

Then he interviewed South Trimble, clerk of the house, and learned that although Ball filed notice of a

contest shortly after the elections in November, 1930, he had failed to perfect his contest by filing the customary charges of ballot box frauds. The law allows thirty days for filing of such charges.

The mayor also compared notes with Speaker John N. Garner, and they agreed between themselves that not only does the evidence indicate that the Republicans "stole the election" in the old Eighth district, but that also mysterious circumstances surround the failure of the Democratic candidate to follow through in his fight.

Garner is angry about the Ball-Vestal incident, as was shown when he castigated Indiana Democratic leaders at a luncheon given by Representative Louis Ludlow here about three weeks ago. At the time the contest was allowed to languish, the Republicans apparently had a majority of one in the house and the speakership was at stake.
