### Strength in Securities Is Another Factor in

### Grain Rally.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—Unexpected strength, better conditions for sowing and weather, conditions favoring wheat at an advance at the opening on the Board of Trade today.

Profit-taking and selling order accumulated over the week-end limited the rise to fractions. Liverpool was firm and quiet.

#### Corn Advances Slowly

Corn partook of the firmness of wheat, but the advance was held in check. Oats was firm and dull. At the opening wheat was  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  cent higher; corn was unchanged to  $\frac{1}{4}$  cent higher, and oats was  $\frac{1}{4}$  cent higher.

Cash interest rates have been fairly active in the oats futures and continue to buy on all dips. Speculation has been more general than recently, but trade remains rather small.
