The degree work will begin at 4, and a banquet will be served at 6. Following the dinner will be a short entertainment and speeches.

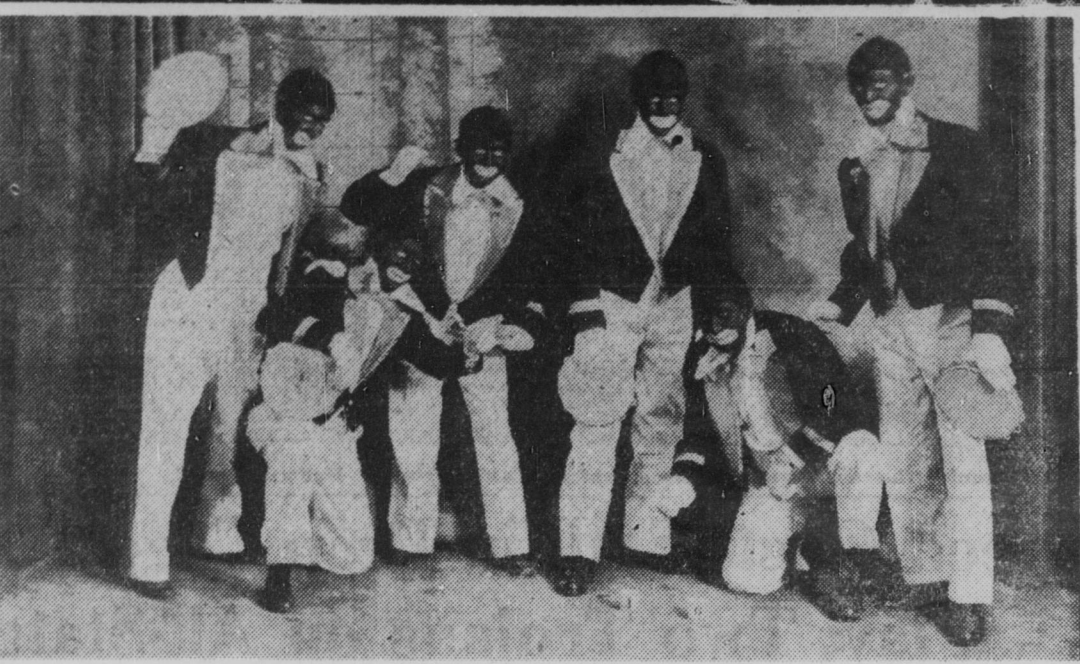
O. E. S. RITES TONIGHT
