

RUSS-JAPANESE WAR IS CERTAIN, AVERS PALMER

Famed Correspondent Sees
Inevitable Conflict; 'Bullish'
on U. S.

"War between Japan and Russia is inevitable . . . America will not be drawn into a war in the Orient . . . The United States need fear no more danger from the depression . . . I'm completely bullish" on the United States.

Switching from a discussion of Trotsky's interview on the Manchurian war scare in The Times Monday to our nation's war on the depression, and the country's best Page One story the of Lindbergh kidnapping, Frederick Palmer, noted war correspondent, visited Indianapolis today.

Despite thirty years of following the beat of martial drums and crackle of shells, Palmer still quivers with delight at the prospect of covering conflicts with nations.

"I'm 59 and if I hadn't been engaged so I couldn't get away, I'd have gone to Shanghai," he said.

Trotzki in his interview Monday was right in part. War between Japan and Russia is inevitable. When Russia moves through Manchuria to get to the sea, the war will come.

He disagreed with Trotsky's statement that Russia would not be hampered in fighting Japan in Siberia and Manchuria.

"Russia can't get the troops," he said.

During the last year Palmer has been visiting industrial, farming, mining and other sectors of the nation and writing of the effects of the depression in various sections for the American Legion monthly.

"You don't hear the defeatist talk on the Pacific coast that you hear farther east," he commented.

"All weak financial institutions and shoestring projects have been eliminated. Banks have been bolstered in the nation. I'm a perfect bull on the United States."

Turning to the Lindbergh kidnapping he scoffed at the possibility that the abductors might have gone to Europe.

"Detection would be easier in France and England, especially France, than here. It's hard to say what has happened to the baby, but you know a baby of twenty months must have the best of care to live," he asserted.

Palmer is visiting the editorial offices of the American Legion monthly and the legion's national headquarters during his stay in the city. He is at the Claypool.
