TAX 'AGITATORS' MADE TARGETS OF LESLIE JIBE

'Why Don't Those Ardent Reformists Seek Office?' Queries Governor.

AGovernor Harry G. Leslie expressed surprise today that "so few" of the ardent tax reform enthusiasts are candidates for the legislature in the primary Tuesday.

"All this agitation regarding taxation has a very beneficial effect and I am glad to see the numerous organizations being formed to discuss the subject," Leslie declared.

"But it does seem to me that those who have concrete ideas on the subject should translate them into action by coming out of the grand state and getting into the game."

"It is in the legislature that change must be brought about. I am sorry to see that most of those who have led in the agitation are not offering themselves as candidates."

"In my opinion it would be much

better for them to take part on the floor of the house or senate, rather than to come to the session as lobbyists."

Modernization of the machinery of government is the essential thing in cutting governmental costs, the Governor asserted. He said he will write something on this subject before his retirement from office as a guide for successors, based on his own experience in office.

This week he sent Ross Teckmeyer, field examiner of the state board of accounts, to Michigan to study the centralized accounting system for institutions of that state. There the accounts for all penal and charitable institutions are kept at the statehouse.

The system may have something to offer as a suggestion for the future in Indiana, Leslie said.

"When an industry buys a new labor-saving device, the old machine is scrapped," the chief executive continued. "But it seems that when government procures a new machine, the old one also is kept, just for the sake of tradition."

As an example, he cited the growth in county governmental machinery, from treasurer to auditor and recorder. Each new office meant new names on the pay roll, and, although the work is done now by modern office machinery, the old offices and all the old places on the pay roll stay, he declared.
