

NATION FACES CRIME CRISIS, SAYS PERSHING

Repeal of Prohibition Is Demanded by General; Urges Vigilantes.

NEW YORK, May 20.—General John J. Pershing warned today that the nation faces a crisis from its criminal army "more insidious, but not less dangerous than in the World war."

The commander-in-chief of the A. E. F. demanded repeal of prohibition, holding that it has largely financed the post-war underworld. Pershing also advocated two other means of combatting the crime evils, he favors organization of local vigilantes and adoption of the European system of police identification cards for every resident.

"I do not," the general said, "question the sincerity of prohibition, but time has come for some solution which takes more account of the traits of human nature."

Pershing explained his plan for police identification cards, which would be miniature passports with a photograph attached, as designed to end "men changing their names as they would their coats." He would provide a heavy penalty for forging a card or disregarding regulations concerning its use.

Pershing's outline of his campaign against crime was contained in an article written for the American Magazine, published today.

PROTEST JUNK YARD PROJECT

50 Ask Park Board to Ban Business.

Protests against allowance of a dealer's junk yard near Indiana park, on West Washington street, were laid before park board members Thursday.

Filing of a petition by Samuel Goldsmith, junk dealer, for permission to build a business place, brought a delegation of fifty residents to the park board.

They were led by Lee Harvey of 24 Neal avenue, Belmont Civic League president. Alva Kooker, attorney, acted as spokesman for the protesters.

"We feel it not only would injure our property but would hurt our school in that vicinity," Harvey declared.

The board declined to act until the zoning board had considered Goldsmith's petition for a building permit.

Rooker argued the park board could control all ground within 500 feet of a public park.

Jackiel Joseph, park board president, explaining there was doubt as to the board's jurisdiction in such cases, told the delegation to return for a hearing at a later date. Residents of the neighborhood held a second protest session Thursday night at the West Washington Street Presbyterian church, Miley and West Washington streets.

PINCHOT PLEADS FOR PLAIN FOLK

Outlines 21 Points Seen as Needed for Recovery.

EVANSTON, Ill., May 20.—The "plain people" of the nation will secure the rights and benefits "which should belong to them," Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania declared, if his program of twenty-one points, which he outlined to the young Republican club, is adopted.

Direct federal unemployment relief, federal work on a vast scale, old age pensions, "reflation" of the dollar, much higher income taxes, national conservation of coal and oil and federal supervision of stock exchanges are included in the Governor's program.

He also advocated the six-hour day and five-day week, farm relief through the equalization plan, an effective tariff, "regulation that regulates" for public utilities, vote of the people before the nation enters war, suppression of racketeering, abolition of slums, limitation of election expenses, a six-year presidential term, an international economic conference and American leadership in gradual world disarmament.

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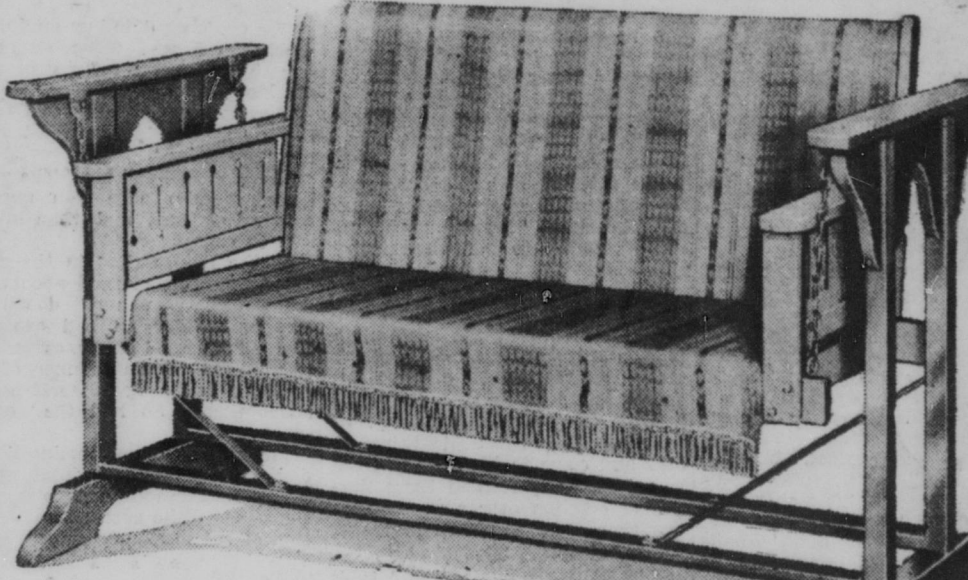

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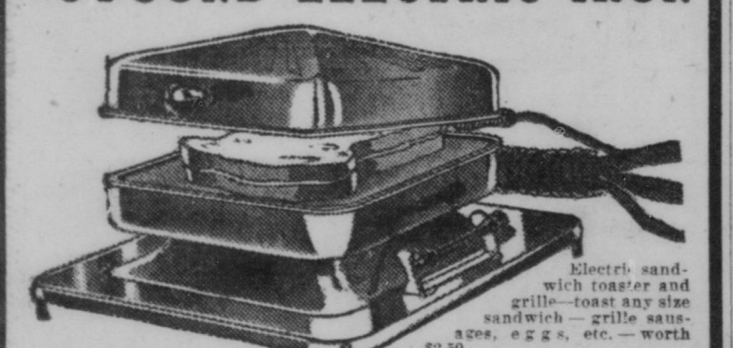
