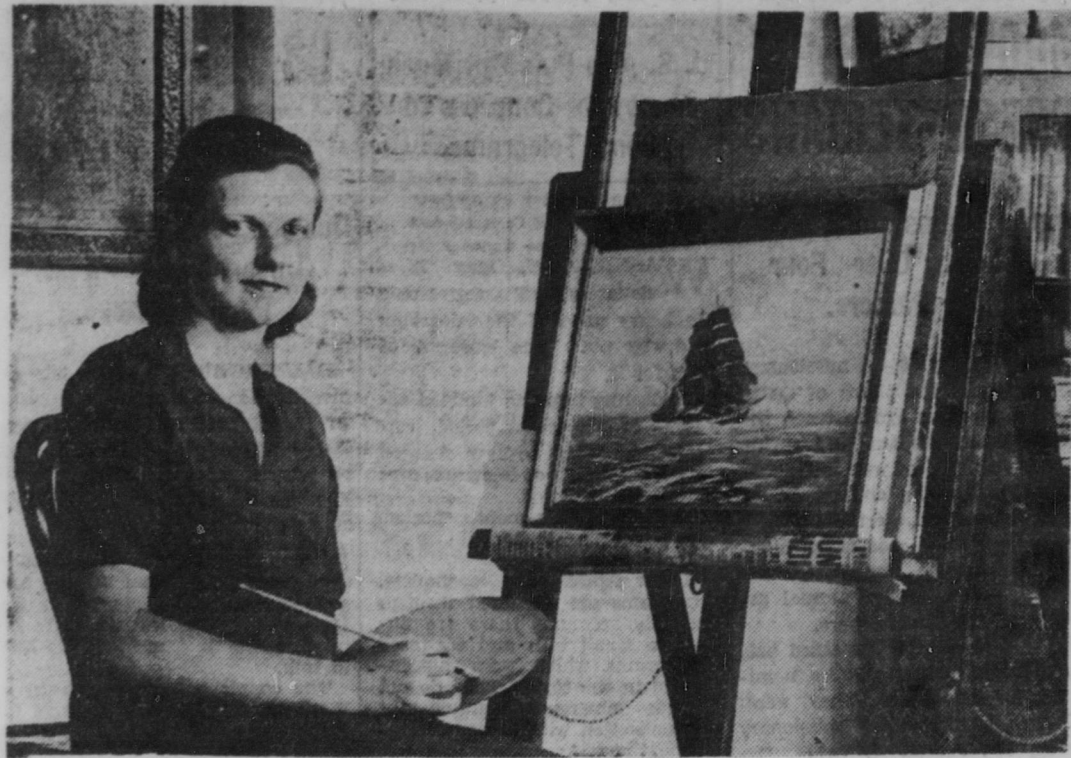
Ward-Belmont Luncheon Will Be Held June 4 at Marott
