

GARBO PLAYS ROLE OF CAFE ENTERTAINER IN NEW MOVIE

'Forgotten Commandments,' With Sari Marita, European Actress, in the Cast, Is Now Film Feature on New Bill at the Indiana.

FOLLOWING close upon the heels of "Grand Hotel," Greta Garbo makes her latest appearance on the screen in "As You Desire Me," filmization of the widely-discussed Luigi Pirandello play which was presented on Broadway last season. The picture opened Friday at Loew's Palace.

"As You Desire Me" is Garbo's seventeenth production in this country, marking the close of her sixth year on the screen since 1926, when she was brought from Sweden to the United States to make her debut in "The Torrent."

George Fitzmaurice, responsible for such cinema successes as "Mata Hari" and "Strangers May Kiss," directed the new Garbo film, and is said to have mounted the picture with a wealth of beautiful settings and natural backgrounds.

William Daniels, who has photographed all of Garbo's pictures, again was behind the camera and the star's costumes were designed by Gilbert Adrian, who has achieved an enviable reputation for his ability to create striking gowns for the exotic Swedish actress.

In "As You Desire Me," Garbo plays the role of a Budapest cafe entertainer whose remarkable resemblance to a woman believed to be dead brings about an amazing dramatic conflict. Melynn Douglas, who played opposite Gloria Swanson in "Tonight or Never," has the leading male role as the Italian nobleman, Count Bruno, who accepts Zara, the cafe singer, as the wife whom he believed to have been killed by invaders during the World war.

The renowned character actor, Erich Von Stroheim, enacts the role of Salter, a malignant novelist, who seeks to prevent Zara from wresting free of his lecherous grasp. An important role is also filled by Owen Moore as the man who discovers Zara in the cafe and causes her to masquerade as another man's wife.

Also supporting Garbo in "As You Desire Me" are Hedda Hopper, Raefela Ottiano, Warburton Gamble, Albert Conti, William Ricciardi and Roland Varno, locations on the magnificent Gillespie estate at Santa Barbara and scenes filmed off Laguna representing the "Feast of Midsummer," celebrated by Italian lovers, bring gorgeous scenery into the background of the story.

"MAN ABOUT TOWN" NOW AT THE APOLLO

THE season of the Berkell Players at Keith's theater will be brought to a close with the final performance tonight of Ferenc Molnar's new comedy, "The Good Fairy."
