

THOUSANDS TO END CAREERS IN GRADE SCHOOLS

Commencement Exercises
Are Scheduled Today
and Thursday.

Between 3,000 and 4,000 eighth grade pupils in the Indianapolis public schools will receive diplomas at commencement exercises today and Thursday.

Approximately seventy elementary schools of the city are advancing pupils into the secondary schools. A group of the songs by the boys' glee club, and another group by the girls' club featured the graduation exercises at Benjamin Harrison school No. 2, at 700 North Delaware street, at 9 this morning. Frank Patocka, captain of the school's traffic squad, presented traffic discharges to the members of his unit. Fifty-seven pupils received diplomas, which were presented by Miss Mary McGee, principal.

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TIMES MARBLE TOURNAMENT NEAR GRAND WINDUP

Play in Five Sections Will End City Matches, Then on to Ocean City.

Marble play in five sectional centers Friday, Saturday and next Tuesday, will wind up preliminary action in the annual Indianapolis Times city-wide marble championship, and will boost the total of sectional champions to twenty-five.

All sectional winners will gather at Willard park Friday, June 17, at 2 p. m., to battle for the city title and the free trip to the national play at Ocean City, N. J., the latter part of June as guest of The Times.

One scene of action Friday will be at school No. 32 at 3 p. m. Players from school No. 36 also will engage in this sectional action at school No. 32.

Lieutenant Frank Owen and Timothy McMahon of the city recreation department safety division, will hold sectional play on the yard of Cathedral grade school at 1:30 Friday afternoon.

Due to a drowning, Lieutenant Owen and Tim McMahon were unable to hold sectional play at Fall Creek playgrounds Tuesday afternoon, but will conduct matches there at 3:30 Friday. They notified all players attending schools in this section today to be there Friday instead.

On Saturday afternoon at 1:30 the Willard park sectional play will be held for pupils of schools Nos. 3, 7, 8, 9, 14, 15, 21, 28, 39, Trinity Evangelical Lutheran, St. Joseph's, and Holy Cross Catholic schools.

Next Tuesday afternoon at 2 p. m. the grand finale in sectional play will be held at Willard park. This sectional is for any boy or girl in the city who has missed competing in sectional tournament action in their district.

It also will be for pupils of Schools 1, 2, 10, 20, 22, 25, 27, 29, 73, where grounds are covered with loose rock, making rings and play impossible. These schools also are located long distances from parks and playgrounds.

Must Be Under 15

Any boy or girl is eligible to compete in the Times marble championship if they are under 15 and will not become 15 before July 1.

The game played is ringer. All marbles and shooters are furnished by The Times. All expenses of the Indianapolis winner will be paid to the national tournament in Ocean City, a chaperon provided, and in addition several pleasure jaunts will be made from Ocean City to historical points of interest, swimming parties held in the ocean and other fun fetes provided.
