## Daily Recipe

**RHUBARB SALAD**  
2 tablespoons gelatin  
3 cups diced pink rhubarb or  
2 cups canned rhubarb  
1 cup sugar  
3-4 cup raisins  
1-2 cup cold water  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
1 cup chopped celery

Soak gelatin in cold water for ten minutes. If raw, put rhubarb in saucepan with 1 1/2 cups hot water and boil for 5 minutes. Add sugar, remove from fire and add lemon rind and gelatin. Cool in a pan of very cold water until the mixture begins to thicken—then add raisins, celery and pour into molds. Chill, turn out on lettuce leaf, garnish with salad dressing.
