

FARMER YOUTH HELD FOR NIGHT CRIME CAREER

Admits Six Holdups in Central Indiana, Say City Police.

A farmer boy who turned bandit by night after tending crops all day on his farm home near Martinsville, has confessed to six holdups here and in central Indiana towns, police said today.

He is Floyd Dunn, 20, living nine miles east of Martinsville, who was captured early Wednesday by police and later was identified as the bandit who "lost his nerve" while robbing a restaurant at 139 South Illinois street.

Got Trousers, Cash
In an alleged confession to police, Dunn is said to have admitted robbing three stores in Indianapolis, a pharmacy and a restaurant in Franklin and a restaurant in Bloomington.

According to the confession he robbed a dry goods store in the 300 block West Washington street last week, escaping through a quickly-laid police net with a pair of trousers and \$3 in cash.

On one occasion, he is said to have confessed, he slept at police headquarters after his car was stolen, leaving in the morning to stage a robbery on South Meridian street.

On his last robbery, young Dunn threatened the clerk in the South Illinois street restaurant with a revolver, "giving up" the robbery attempt when the clerk revealed there was only a small amount of money in the cash register.

Supporting Family, Claim
"Just let it go," the clerk quoted Dunn as saying.
A few minutes later, a night watchman took the license number of a car parked near the restaurant and summoned police. A squad

Egg Scramble

CHICAGO, June 23.—The celebrated penguin egg case may be carried to "the highest court in the land," to prevent Customs Collector Anthony Czarnecki from "seizing and destroying" the twenty dozen eggs, originally destined for visiting Democrats' delegation.

The hoodoo struck again at the northeast turn of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Wednesday afternoon as Peter Kreis, Knoxville (Tenn.) race driver, crashed over the retaining wall while making an experimental run.

Kreis and Aaron Vance, 3752 Rockville road, incurred broken ribs, cuts and bruises, but were reported in "fair" condition today at city hospital.

That the racing car had crashed was not known by spectators until attaches of the track had toured the brick oval twice in a search for the missing car. It was found Kreis' car, a Studebaker Special, which he drove in the 500 mile race May 30, had skidded and hopped over the

retaining wall at the spot where Billy Arnold crashed in the race. It was reported a tire blowout caused the crash.

Kreis was forced out of the race at the 450-mile mark when his car "kissed" a retaining wall, after he had climbed to tenth place at the 350-mile post.

HIGHWAY BIDS DUE JULY 12

46 Miles of Paving Listed by Road Chiefs.

Bids on forty-six miles of pavement and sixteen miles of grading will be received by the state highway department July 12, the sixth letting of the season, it was announced today by Director John J. Brown.

So far the state highway commission has contracted for 526 miles of high type pavement and sixty-eight miles of grading.

Following are projects in the new letting:

PAVING
State Road 57, Plainville to Elmore, 7.4 miles in Daviess county.
State Road 130, Hobart to Valparaiso, 11.2 miles in Lake and Porter counties.
State Road 22, Burlington to Ridgeway, 5.3 miles in Carroll and Howard counties.
State Road 22, Ridgeway to Kokomo, 7.5 miles in Howard county.
U. S. Highway 31, Crothersville relocation, 1.2 miles in Jackson county.
State Road 5, from two miles south to four miles north of Warren, 6.1 miles in Huntington county.
State Road 5, from four miles north of Warren to three miles south of Huntington, 6.1 miles in Huntington county.
State Road 123, Clinton west to Illinois

state line, 1.6 miles in Vermillion county.
All paving listed is to be 20-feet wide excepting the relocation project north of Crothersville on Road 21, to remove a hazardous jog, to be eighteen feet, and the project on Road 123, also to be eighteen feet.

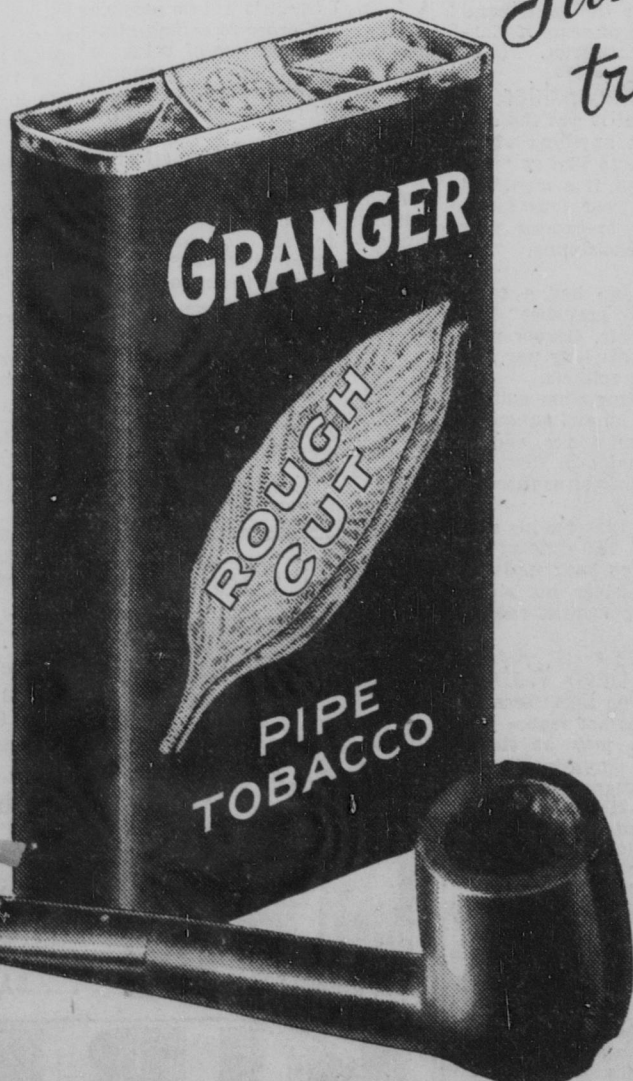
