## Tuberculosis Task Given to Health Board

Patients confined to their beds with tuberculosis, who have been cared for free of charge by the Public Health Nursing Association's service since January, 1931, have been turned over to the newly inaugurated bedside service of the city board of health.

The service was formerly conducted by the P. H. N. A. on a cost basis, due to the tax appropriation voted in 1925 for the care of persons suffering from tuberculosis. Since January, 1931, however, the budget limitations of the city health board have made payment to the P. H. N. A. impossible.

Through the newly established bedside service of the board of health, cases of bed-ridden tuberculosis, which have been handled by the P. H. N. A. will be cared for by the city, while the nursing association will continue to give a pay service and also a free service when requested by the family physician.

Ways and means have been considered to prevent unnecessary duplication of the costly service. The P. H. N. A. will give a general service, the same nurse being trained to give any one of many services required in her district. In many cases where large parts of, or whole families are infected, provision is made for isolation of the worst cases, and to prevent others from developing.

After the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy left for a southern wedding trip. They will be at home on their return at 746 East Orange street.

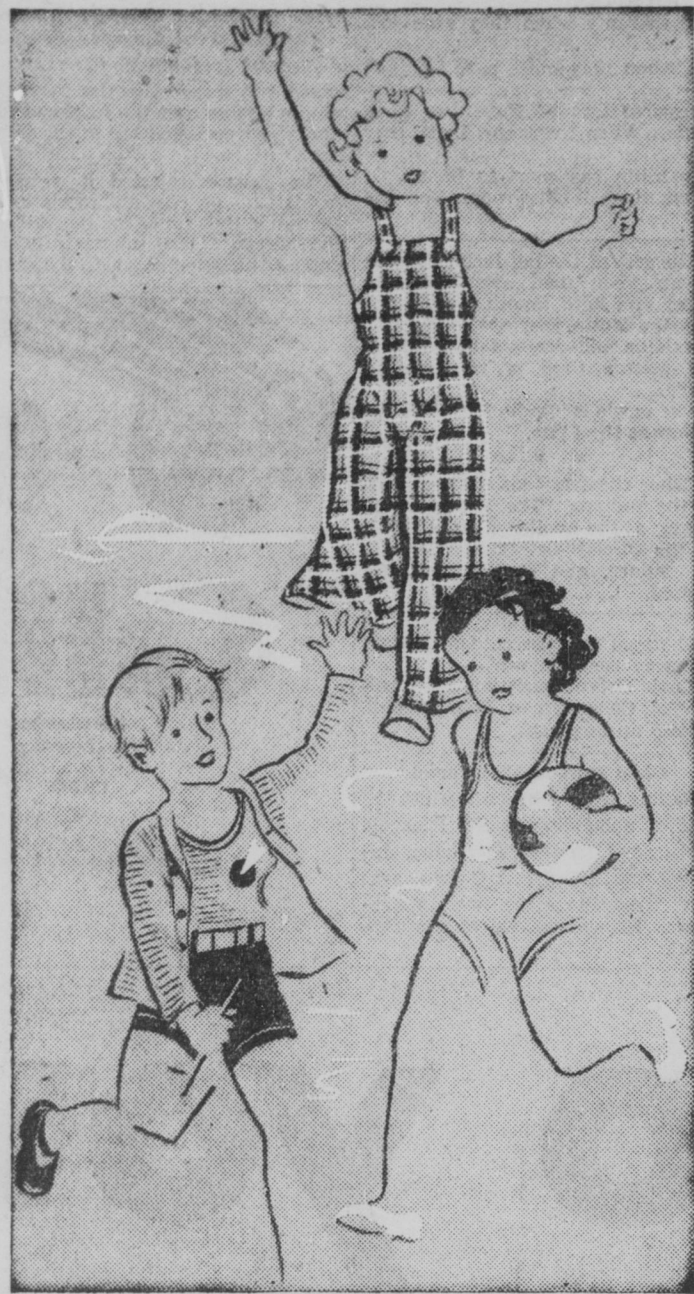
### Guid Clothes Season

## Women to Hear First of Lectures

Child hygiene division of the state board of health announces a new series of lectures on child health and protection, which will be presented before various organizations on demand. The series is to be heard first today at a mass meeting of all local branches of the W. C. T. U., to be held this afternoon at the Y. W. C. A.

The lectures are to be delivered by Dr. Laura Keisker. The subject matter has been prepared to furnish a scientific background for group programs. It will be an attempt to answer any questions and problems coming before this division of the state board of health, which will be helpful in the health protection of mothers and babies.

After each lecture, time will be allowed for questions and suggestions helpful to the mother and child.

An elementary course of study also has been prepared showing as far as is known the influences favorable and those which hinder the ante-natal development of the child.

This includes some instruction in embryology and chemistry, and explains the importance of pre-natal supervision by a physician, and the instruction of both father and mother in factors of health and hygiene; studies in anatomy showing normal and abnormal bone development, and of the food elements essential for energy and for building and for stimulation of growth.

The interrelation of the digestive, the respiratory, and the circulatory systems, the importance of their normal growth and functioning also are discussed.
