

CLAMPS STIFF DISCIPLINE ON BONUS BRIGADE

Commander Waters Drills
His Troops Under
Blazing Sun.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Soldiers of the bonus expeditionary force lined up immediately after breakfast today and went through a stiff hour's drill under a hot sun. Sharp commands of "right" and "double time—march," attested the strict discipline clamped down by Walter W. Waters, forceful young commander-in-chief, elected Wednesday and given dictatorial powers. Waters is determined to make a brisk military unit of the 15,000 veterans, who had become little but squatters, since the senate's defeat of the bonus bill.

At the same time Waters was making plans to extend the D. E. P. throughout the United States. If his plan succeeds, other cities may harbor bonus armies similar to the one here.

Waters proposes to send veterans, schooled by underfire experience at the Washington front, to various localities to organize drill units. These would remain stationed where formed, providing an ever-present illustration of the plight of unemployed veterans. Their presence would be their plea.

"The bonus, of course, is the main idea," Waters explained. "But we feel that such solidification will be the first step toward the relief of all unemployment."

No reactionary groups will be tolerated and these corps would stand ready to aid in the enforcement of law and order."

'SPANKS' MOTORIST FOR NOT THANKING LAWYER

Municipal Judge Indirectly Rebukes
Defendant in Court.

Indirect rebuke was administered to a defendant in municipal court Thursday by Judge Clifton R. Cameron for failing to thank an attorney appointed by the court as counsel.

J. H. Mumaw, 617 North Illinois street, was in court charged with failing to stop at a preferential street, lacking one license plate and a certificate of title for an automobile he was driving. He asked for a continuance, but Cameron objected, stating it was not the practice to grant delay in such cases. Mumaw said he desired delay so he could consult an attorney.

Thomas C. Whallon, former city judge, was among attorneys in the courtroom and was selected as counsel for Mumaw. He succeeded in obtaining dismissal of the certificate of title charge, and on the other two cases, Mumaw was fined \$1 and costs each.

After the trial, Mumaw walked away from Whallon.

Calling Whallon to the bench, Cameron said:

"The court appreciates your services in preventing delay of hearing this case; and as the defendant did not thank you, I will thank you for him."

SALES COMPETITION BY ARMY POSTS PROBED

Private Business Houses Complain
About Practice.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Complaints against competition of army posts with private business houses will be aired at a series of hearings to be held by the Shannon house investigating committee at Kansas City beginning July 18.

Chairman Joseph Shannon of Kansas City and the members of the committee appointed to look into the merchandising activities of army and navy exchanges will attend these hearings, which will constitute the only ones to be held this summer by the full committee.

Individual members will hold others in their respective localities, if there is demand for them.

Competition at Ft. Sill, Okla., and at Leavenworth and Ft. Riley, Kan., will be investigated at the Kansas City meeting.

16TH ST. WIDENING TO BE ENDED AUG. 15

Traffic to Be Stopped, but Tram Service Will Be Continued.

Widening of Sixteenth street will be completed about Aug. 15, it was announced today. Traffic will be stopped at the intersection with Illinois street early next week, but there will be no interruption of street car service, as temporary tracks will be used.

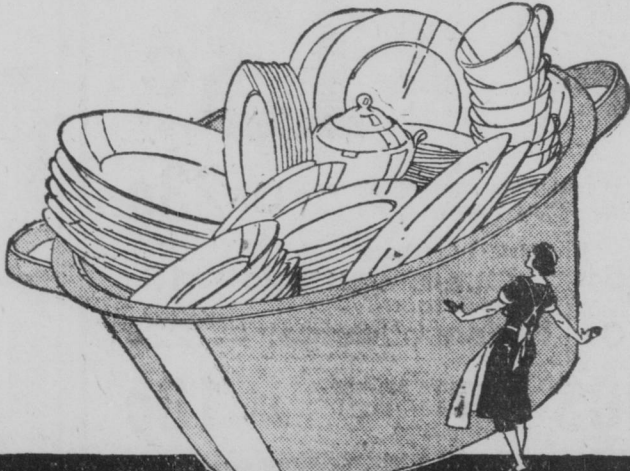

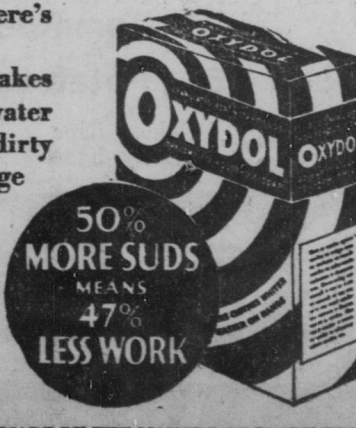
