

ELKS LEAVING SATURDAY FOR LODGE SESSION

Past Exalted Rulers to Lead Delegation to Birmingham.

Party composed of members of the Elks lodges in Indiana, their families and friends, headed by Hubert S. Riley and J. C. Gribben, past exalted rulers of the order, will leave Indianapolis Saturday to attend the sixty-eighth grand lodge convention at Birmingham, Ala., July 9 to 15.

The train will leave the Union station at 2:10 p. m. Delegates from southern Indiana will join the party at Shelbyville, Greensburg and Cincinnati. The group will be entertained at the Elks home in Cincinnati at night. Leaving Cincinnati at 10 p. m. the party will arrive in Chattanooga early Sunday morning.

A sight-seeing tour will be made through Chattanooga, to Lookout mountain, Chickamauga park, and Lookout mountain caverns. Leaving Chattanooga at 5:20 the train will arrive in Birmingham at 9:30. Indiana headquarters there will be the Hotel Thomas Jefferson.

Grand lodge officers will arrive in Birmingham Saturday. Sunday special services will be held in local churches for the visitors. A pilgrimage to the grave of B. M. Allen, past grand exalted ruler, in Elmwood cemetery, will be made Sunday afternoon. The memorial address will be delivered by John R. Coen, grand exalted ruler.
