

U. S. DEMANDS TEETH BE PUT IN ARMS PACT

Americans Will Present
Counter Resolution
at Geneva.

GENEVA, July 14.—The United States delegation informed the world arms conference today it would introduce a counter-resolution next week if the present "meaningless" resolution prepared by Great Britain is not changed.

Hugh Gibson, head of the American delegation, informed Arthur Henderson of Great Britain, president of the conference, of the firm opposition of the United States to the Simon resolution.

The United Press was informed the American delegation already had prepared a counter-resolution, containing the major principles of the Hoover one-third arms cut, especially on reduction of military and naval personnel.

The American delegates frankly are angry over alleged attempts at scuttling the Hoover proposals. They also appeared to regard the Anglo-French agreement as tending to isolate the United States.

The news of the agreement came just as Arthur Henderson, president of the conference, and others helping Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, draft the disarmament resolution, were preparing to hurry the resolution through the general commission Saturday.

The opposition to the plan to "railroad the resolution through the general commission broke when Ambassador Hugh Gibson informed the president of the commission, Edward Beneš of Czechoslovakia, that the United States would oppose any "Meaningless resolution."

The American stand was backed quickly by other powers. They had complained that the resolution was destined to become a document of meaningless phrases without concrete proposals for arms reductions.

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TWO PREMIERS TO BE HELD TONIGHT

James Cagney in "Winner Takes All" and Stuart Erwin in "Make Me a Star," Will Start Their Local Runs.

JAMES CAGNEY, remembered for his performance in "The Crowd Roars," comes to the Apollo tonight at 10:30 o'clock in the special premiere showing of his new Warner Brothers film, "Winner Takes All." Persons attending the final showing of "Bachelor's Affairs" at 9 o'clock are invited to remain for the new film presentation.

Cagney, is seen as a member of a prize-ring stable, suffering from ill health, due to disputation. He goes to New Mexico for a rest cure, and meets a former cabaret entertainer, with whom he falls in love. While there he drops the rest cure and enters the ring to provide funds for the girl of his heart who is caring for an invalid brother.

Cagney later returns to New York to try a comeback after promising he would return for their marriage. After arriving in New York, he meets a flippant society girl who leads him on only as an oddity. Jimmy takes the new girl seriously, and provides himself with a remade nose and ear, goes in for Fifth Avenue tailors and hires a teacher of etiquette—all in order to make an impression on his friends of the social register.

He loses his reputation and is called a "powder-puff" boxer. During his big test of the ring, the thought comes to him that he is being misled. This situation is said to give vent to one of the most hilarious scenes the screen has offered in many weeks, according to advanced reports.

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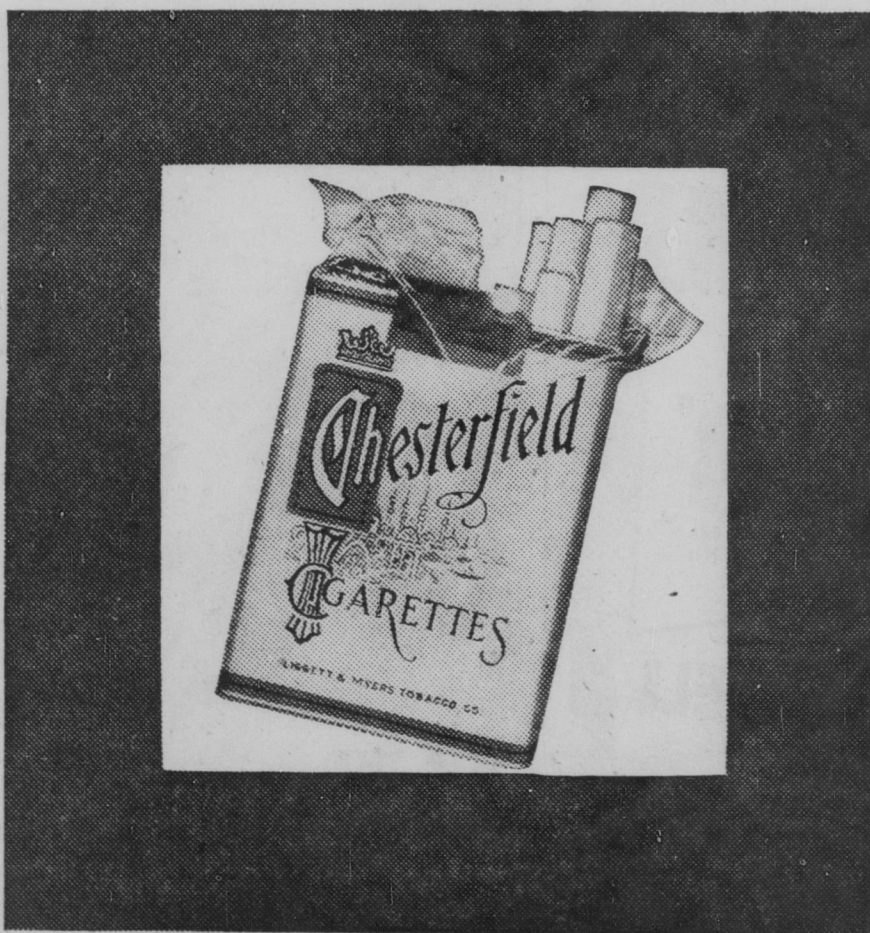
