**DRAFT CAVALRY TROOP
TO PATROL MINE ZONE**

Mounted Force Organized, Join Infantrymen at Shakamak.

Organization of an impromptu cavalry troop to patrol the mine war area, with headquarters at Shakamak state park, was announced today by Adjutant-General Paul Tombaugh.

Forty-two mounted men from the One hundred thirty-ninth field artillery regiment make up the personnel of the mounted patrol. They joined the 250 infantrymen in the field Sunday, Tombaugh reported.

Tombaugh went by plane to the park to conduct an inspection of the new unit Sunday afternoon and Major-General Robert G. Tyndall went on a flying tour of the entire mine area.

Mounted men will supplant the foot soldiers in the area if the expeditious work out, Tombaugh said.

POLICE CHIEF FACES KIDNAP PLOT CHARGES

Nine Are Linked to Case
Where Fish Peddler Was
Held 76 Days.

CLEARFIELD, Pa., Sept. 6.—Information charging conspiracy were filed against nine persons, including a police chief and a private detective today, in connection with the alleged kidnaping of a 48-year-old Hopewell (N. J.) fish peddler, following the Lindbergh baby kidnaping.

In addition, two persons were charged with kidnaping and assault and battery, and six others with being accessories in a total of four informations filed by Sheriff Ira L. McCloskey, Clearfield county.

The charges were based on information given authorities by Garrett Schuch, Hopewell fish peddler, who claimed he was held prisoner for seventy-six days in cottages near Dubois and Somerset, Pa.

J. J. Devine, private detective, and Roy Cummins, his son-in-law, Dubois, were accused of the actual kidnaping of Schuch from his fish wagon in Hopewell last June 10.

Both Devine and Cummins also were named on charges of assault and battery, and both were included in the information charging conspiracy.

Police Chief R. R. Love, Dubois, who it is claimed knew that the men were holding Schuch in a cottage near Dubois, was one of six men accused of being accessories after the fact.

Love, the other five men, who included Schuch's guards, and a seventh man, Paul Cupp, were named with Devine and Cummins in the general conspiracy information.

**NEW VIOLENCE
IN FARM STRIKE**
Four Truck Drivers Hurt in Iowa Battle.

DES MOINES, Sept. 6.—Preparations for peaceful conferences were combined with reports of violence in the center of the farm strike area today.

While the men who head the various organizations of the Farm Holiday Association in Iowa met here in conference, reports came from Sioux City that four truck drivers were injured and several trucks disabled by highway pickets.

The violence occurred when a group of truck drivers banded together and approached the picket lines in a caravan, fourteen trucks long.

The picket camps were depleted from their maximum strength, but a crowd estimated at 200 barred the road, joined in the battle.

In spite of the opposition, the trucks continued on to Sioux City markets.

**CALL ACCOUNTANTS
TO STATE CONFERENCE**
Bookkeeping Course to Be Given at Statehouse Sept. 19.

Accountants from fifteen large electric companies conducting power loops in the state were summoned today to a conference at the statehouse Sept. 19, to learn better bookkeeping.

Invitations to the meeting were drafted by Commissioner Howell Ellis, after discovering that the annual reports of many companies are not made on the city-wide unit plan as required by commission rulings.
