OHIO BATTLE FACED ON BOOST IN GAS RATES

Governor Advises Columbus to Fight Public Service Ruling.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 5.—A prolonged legal struggle over Ohio natural gas rates was in prospect here today as a result of a decision by the state public utilities commission, which in the face of re-

duced purchasing power of consumers has increased the Columbus scale from 48 to 55 cents a thousand feet.

Millions of dollars are at stake, since the increased rate is estimated to involve an addition of \$560,000 to the consumers' bill in Columbus alone, and rate fights in other large cities will be affected by the outcome of the Columbus case.

Columbus city officials have an-

nounced they will carry their case to the state supreme court, a move advised by Governor George White, who openly expressed disappointment that the commission rejected the city's application for a continuation of the present 48-cent rate.

The lower rate will continue while the litigation is in progress.
