

LIGHT BUYING HOLDS FUTURE PRICES STEADY

Lower Liverpool Reports Offset by Strength in Securities.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Wheat held firm as the Board of Trade opened today on scattered buying, starting unchanged to 1/4 cent higher.

The firmness in stocks more than offset the easiness at Liverpool. Larger Argentine shipments and a slower demand caused the English market to ease, although it was steady at the decline on the absence of pressure.

Trading locally was light but offerings were limited. Corn was unchanged to 1/4 cent higher. Oats were up 1/4 cent, but rye was unchanged and barley 1/4 cent higher. Trading was dull. Provisions were steady.

A steady demand in foreign markets and an increasing demand domestically for cash wheat is the outstanding feature of the market. This offsets talk of the domestic allotment plan now occupying the attention of the house of representatives which local operators believe will not pass, as it places to heavy a burden on the ultimate consumer. Liverpool was not as strong as expected, being unchanged to 1/4 cent lower at mid-afternoon.

The country is offering corn a little more freely, but the eastern market still is dominated by the action of wheat.

Canada is reported to have sold some oats for export recently, but this has had little effect here. The market is very dull, with trading confined largely to the May delivery.
